NEW YORK (AP) — Diana Dors, Britain's answer to Marilyn Monroe, arrived on the liner Queen Elizabeth today wearing a dress which she admitted was the ultimate in revelation.

She was greeted by a horde of reporters, newsmen and television cameramen and newspaper photographers.

She first held a press conference, then went to the sun deck to pose for pictures. She wore a white cotton brocade dress with straps crossed over the shoulders, very low-cut in front.

Air Chief Says It Will Keep US Supremacy

WASHINGTON (AP) — Air Secretary Donald A. Quarles said today the administration's Air Force budget is big enough to enable this nation, and its allies, to maintain air supremacy over the Red bloc.

Quarles made the statement as the Senate headed for a showdown vote late today on a Democratic move to boost the Air Force budget by \$1,160,000,000.

Quarles defended the administration's original Air Force budget as adequate in testimony before a Senate Armed Services subcommittee.

Could the Air Force use an additional 500 million or billion? "I can't say I can't use it," he replied, but.

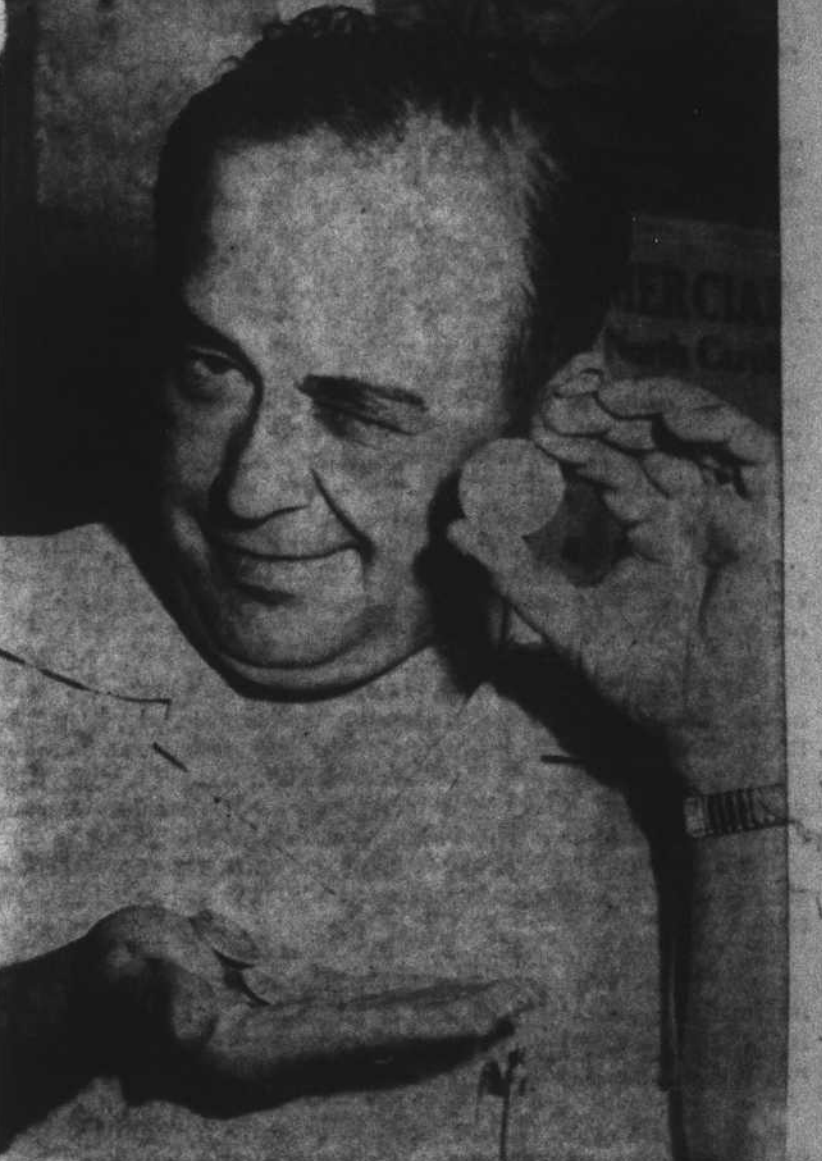
"I regard the budget which President Eisenhower presented in January, along with the supplemental request in April, as an adequate basis with which to work out our program in the coming fiscal year."

He said that the U. S. fleet of B47 bombers, with their tank planes and overseas bases, now is "the most powerful striking force on earth."

At a White House legislative conference, administration spokesmen urged Republican leaders to hold the line against the Democratic move.

The administration insisted it wants no increase at all in the pending Air Force budget. "But it said it would accept a compromise 500 million increase offered by Republican senators rather than the biggest boost pushed by the Democrats. The Democrats had the edge.

ON EVE OF BIG MEETING

Britain Cuts Back Defence Spending

LONDON (AP) — Britain today announced a 141 million dollar cutback in current defense spending.

The cutback was announced on the eve of a crucial commonwealth prime ministers' meeting here which observers said could make or break the empire alliance. It came shortly after the Foreign Office announced that a Soviet trade mission would arrive soon to start doing business on the \$2,800,000,000 trade offer made by Russian leaders on their April visit.

Chancellor of the Exchequer Harold Macmillan announced an overall 212 million cut would be made in this year's government spending as part of an anti-inflation economy drive. Two-thirds of the savings will be made in defense spending.

The British army suffered the biggest chop, the navy the second largest, and the Royal Air Force the least.

The cuts were in line with British policy. (Continued On Page Four)

McCarthy Attacks Justice Earl Warren

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy (R-Wis) charged today that Chief Justice Warren has "become a hero" to the Daily Worker, Communist newspaper.

"I don't say that he is a Communist, but there is something radically wrong with him," McCarthy said.

McCarthy attacked Warren at an internal security subcommittee hearing on bills to nullify a recent Supreme Court ruling which prohibited security risk sittings in "non-sensitive" federal jobs. "I think it is extremely unfortunate he was ever confirmed as chief justice," McCarthy said.

MIAMI (AP) — A three-month-old king of beasts reigned today over 35,000 Lions Club members from all over the nation and the world who gathered here for their 39th annual convention.

The lion cub, snarling as he arrived at the airport yesterday, will lead the convention parade. The cub, named Cee-Zee, is a gift of the city of Portland, Ore., and the Portland Lions Club.

Cee-Zee, born in Portland's 500 March 27, will serve as official mascot for the convention, and then will go to the Santiago, Chile, as a gift of the serving cub Santiago, the present president of International Lions.

In exchange, Santiago Lions will send Portland a Chilean condor. The four-day convention, which has its first general session Wednesday, will be highlighted by major addresses by Vice President Richard Nixon, Henry Cabot Lodge, permanent U. S. representative to the United Nations, and Gov. Luther H. Hodges of North Carolina. Gov. LeRoy Collins of Florida will deliver a welcoming message.
