

# BULLETINS

WASHINGTON (UP)—Down payments on new homes are about to be cut drastically, it was reported today. This should touch off a home-buying and building spurt, according to industry sources.

WAUSU, Wis., (UP)—An investigation into the suspected polio death of a boy who had a full series of Salk vaccine shots has been launched here. Dr. E. P. Ludwig said Lee Krubzack, 7, died Sunday in a Madison, Wis., hospital. Ludwig said he suspected polio as the cause of death.

LONDON (UP)—The Western powers present today a plan for halting nuclear weapon tests if Russia will agree with them to stop making atomic weapons. Informed sources said the whole outcome of three months negotiations at the five-power disarmament conference hinges on Russia's answer.

WALHALLA, S. C., (UP)—Two men were to be sentenced today for the rape May 17 of a 17-year-old girl. Herman Hooper, 22, of Cashiers, N. C., and Ross Bryson, 47, of Anderson County, were convicted of rape by the Oconee County General Sessions Court Thursday. The men are brothers-in-law.

WASHINGTON (UP)—Former Civil Defense Chief Val Peterson called today for a nationwide system of home-installed warning devices to prevent "needless" deaths from hurricanes and other natural disasters.

WASHINGTON (UP)—The Communist world will get its first look next September at an American phenomenon—the supermarket. The Commerce Department said a fully-stocked supermarket will star in the U. S. exhibit at the International Trade Fair in Zagreb, Yugoslavia, Sept. 7 through 22.

JERUSALEM (UP)—An Israeli Foreign Ministry official today said Egyptian and Syrian claims that Israel is massing troops near the Syrian border are "completely false."

MIAMI (UP)—The weather bureau warned today that weather conditions are ripe for the development of another tropical storm in the Gulf of Mexico this month, but that it probably will not hit the U. S. mainland.

WASHINGTON (UP)—Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson told Congress today that proposed legislation to require President Eisenhower to "denounce" status of forces agreements would destroy this country's defense against communism.

WASHINGTON (UP)—The House Irrigation and Reclamation Subcommittee today approved, 15 to 12, a motion which could scuttle legislation calling for a federal high dam project at Hells Canyon.

WASHINGTON (UP)—A spokesman for Georgia's governor asked the Senate today whether the drive to curb filibusters is the forerunner of a move to limit the voting rights of senators from states.

WASHINGTON (UP)—The Senate today approved the nomination of Robert B. Anderson of New York and Texas to be secretary of the Treasury.

BRYSON CITY (UP)—The State Bureau of Investigation stepped in today after two dynamite explosions and another dynamite attempt at a strike—bound wood-working firm here.

HICKORY (UP)—A Taylorsville barber, wanted in connection with a highway accident near here, was arrested near Taylorsville early today. James M. Barnes, 49, had been the object of a widespread search by officers and bloodhounds since the collision Monday night near here.

WASHINGTON (UP)—Sen. Clifford P. Case likened Senate filibusters today to "the medieval practice of trial by ordeal" and urged the Senate to end them. The New Jersey Republican made the comparison in testimony prepared for a Senate Rules Subcommittee studying proposals for changes in the Senate's anti-filibuster rule.

OZARK, Ark., (UP)—The Ozark School Board has decided to integrate Ozark High School this fall. Three Negro students are expected to enroll. Supt. R. L. Graves said Monday the school board decided to segregate the high school "as a matter of economics."

JOHNSON CITY, Tenn., (UP)—Three new cases of polio, making a total of 13, were reported here today as health officials launched a drive to inoculate some 10,000 children here with Salk vaccine.

TRIESTE, Italy (UP)—Two American youths whose hitchhike tour of Europe turned into an international incident, sailed for home today aboard the liner Saturnia. They were Warren W. Hair, 20, of North Augusta, S. C., and Myon Appel Gilbert, 20, of Waltebo, S. C., who wandered into Hungary last May "just to look around" and found themselves in jail.

WASHINGTON (UP)—Many of the persons killed by Hurricane Audrey would be alive today if they had heeded warnings to flee their homes, according to a Coast Guard safety officer. Cmdr. James N. Schrader, Coast Guard search and rescue officer in New Orleans, told a press conference the Weather Bureau warned of the hurricane 36 hours in advance and "pinpointed to the hour" its arrival time 14 hours before it hit.

ASHEVILLE (UP)—An apparent earthquake early today rattled windows and shook buildings in western North Carolina and eastern Tennessee. The tremor, described as "fairly heavy," lasted for about one minute. It occurred at 4:32 a. m.

COLUMBIA (UP)—South Carolina Baptists plan to build the first unit of the Betha Home For the Aging in 1958 at a cost of \$500,000, it was announced here today.

ST. ANDREWS, Scotland (UP)—Frank Stranahan of Toledo, Ohio, assured himself a place in the British Open golf tournament when he shot a two-under-par 70 today in the final qualification round, but Cary Middlecoff of Memphis, Tenn., with a 73 today and 148 total, was on the borderline and dependent upon the rest of the field.

## Farmer Loses Foot In Baler

JAMESTOWN, N. D. (AP) — A farmer lost a foot in an hour-long struggle with a hay baler, then mounted his tractor and drove home to summon aid.

Doctors said frictions from the rollers of the machine cauterized blood vessels in his leg and probably saved his life.

William Wilson, 37, was in good condition today at Jamestown Hospital, and physicians said he might leave in two weeks.

Wilson said he attempted to speed the baling process Sunday and began to push hay into the machine with his foot. It was caught—and the powerful rollers began to tug his body into the machine.

After an hour, the rollers crushed the bone about 10 inches below the knee and Wilson was freed.

He tied a belt-tourniquet around his thigh, mounted the tractor and remained conscious until he was taken into surgery at the hospital.
