WASHINGTON (UP)—Senate investigators spurred by Russia's Sputnik, began asking the Pentagon for missile data today in what could become the most important investigation of the coming session of Congress.

WASHINGTON (UP)—It's mainly true that the Russians say about Iskustvennyi Spuntaik Zemli ISZ. That was the verdict of U. S. scientists after the Soviet earth satellite, Sputnik for short, had winged around the earth 70 times.

LONDON (UP)—The Soviet Union opened a double-barreled diplomatic offensive today for "peaceful co-existence and general disarmament" and said its successful satellite was the "best propagandist" for a course. Radio signals from the artificial satellite perked up again today and British scientists who Tuesday night predicted this fall "within a matter of hours" reversed themselves and said it was still going strong.

HONOLULU (UP)—The 14th Naval District said today that the Navy-chartered Tanker Mission San Miguel reported it ran aground at top speed on Laysan Reef, 775 miles northwest of Hawaii, but a search plane from Midway radioed there was no sign of it there.

BURLINGTON (UP)—Pioneer Alamance County industry and business leader Eugene M. Long died in a Burlington hospital Tuesday. He was 79. Long, a native of Person County, joined National Dyeworks Co., and later became vice president of May Hosiery Mills, Inc.

VIENNA (UP)—Rep. W. Sterling Cile said today he will put Russians and other Communists in some of the key posts of the new International Atomic Energy Agency IAEA. But the New York Republican said he had not given any such pledges in advance to insure his election as head of the atoms-for-peace organization.

MOSCOW (UP)—Radio Moscow said in a home service broadcast tonight that the Soviet earth satellite is gaining speed and "will continue encircling the earth for a long time."

MADISON, Wis., (UP)—A Protestant mother of a child who was turned over to a Jewish couple in adoption proceedings may seek to have the decision overruled by the State Supreme Court, her lawyer said today.

WASHINGTON (UP)—President Eisenhower said today that the United States would be willing to take part in an East-West study of international controls on outer space objects if U. S. allies agree.

Red Sattelite Also Provides Chuckles

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., (UP)—Satellite "spunk" has provided scientists here with chuckles as well as chills.

A spokesman at the Smithsonian Astrophysical Observatory says thousands of calls, ranging from the "very entertaining to the fantastic," have been received from all parts of the world.

John White, information officer for the observatory which is responsible for the visual tracking of the Russian baby moon, cited some.

One caller, who described herself as "a little old lady," told White that she saw two satellites when she got up to pray before sunrise. She said the pair "had long blue and white tails." She ended her lengthy report by saying she was going "to definitely pray" tonight and "watch for those terrible satellites."

Had Five Feet
White said a young girl reported seeing the Russian satellite while driving west of Boston. She said it "was very long and had five little feet and I stopped the car and watched it for forty minutes."

These two reports, along with about thirty others, White classified as "highly imaginative, very entertaining and good listening."

He described hundreds of other prepaid calls from such places as Hawaii, Canada and Mexico "as bordering on the fantastic."

Some of these viewers described the satellite as "moving very fast . . . very slow . . . heading in unusual directions . . . hovering over their homes . . . shaped like a saucer . . . like a sausage . . . changing shapes . . . having a big eye."

Fruitless Chase
Another caller in the "fantastic category" reported two satellites "going by." One was "following the other, with the second going faster than the first but failing to catch it."

Some of the persons in this classification offered to send signed statements, autographed pictures of themselves, their families or their friends to verify their sightings.

Many anxious phoned asked when the satellite would "pass over" their home town or city, and if it was dangerous . . . had spies aboard . . . or possibly could kill anyone."

However, White pointed out, officials were "very grateful for all the telephone calls." He said they were "of great help in the first few hours" following the satellite's launching.

of Gen. John L. Sherburne, Col. William A. Kuhn, who commands the 1,000 airborne troops in Little Rock, and an unidentified aide walking through a crowd of girls in shorts on a school playing field.

He showed newsmen another picture of two "off-duty" soldiers walking among the girls. Girl students at Central go out-of-doors every day in shorts and blouses for gym classes.

Faibus said that as soon as the pictures of the two soldiers were printed, the Army demanded the original pictures so the soldiers could be identified and reprimanded.

With a grin, Faibus said he wonders what the Army thinks about its "high command" walking through the same athletic field looking at the bare legs of the girls.

"Indications at the moment are," he said, that federal troops will have to stay in Little Rock as long as the Negroes go to Central High. Faibus said he does not want to make it appear that he is not open for negotiations, but none is going on right now.

Special Session
Faibus said a "special session of the Legislature is still a likelihood." He has been toying for about two weeks with the idea of a special session to see whether some constitutional means can be found for closing Central High.

He did not produce the evidence to back up the charge in his letter that troops were invading the dressing rooms.

Terry A. Lyon Dies At Age 70

Terry A. Lyon, prominent corporation attorney and Democratic Party leader, died of a heart attack today at his home.

The 70-year-old veteran of both world wars had practiced law here since 1925. A native of Bladen County, he came here in 1909.

Lyon is survived by his wife and two daughters, Mrs. Victor Dawson of Fayetteville and Mrs. William G. Thomas III of Ft. Campbell, Ky. Funeral services are scheduled for 11 a. m., Friday.
