Ike Is Going To Top Level Talks In Paris

WASHINGTON (IP)-President Eisenhower announced today he plans to go to Paris in December to join other heads of government at the annual meeting of the NATO Council.

The President said that before going to Paris he will confer with Republican and Democratic congressional leaders. The conferences, he said ,would be designed to keep this country on a single track in its foreign relations.

While in Europe, the President said he also would like to visit London, but he did not know whether the London visit could be arranged because of the difficulties involved in his remaining out of the country for any length of
