Luther H. Hodges charged today that the federal gov. ernment would be "breaking faith" with the state of North Carolina and its people if tolls are charged on the Blue Ridge Parkway.

"It was certainly clearly understood among our state officials and all our citizens who made available the necessary right-ofway that the Blue Ridge Parkway would be a free public highway, said Hodges.

The North Carolina chief executive led a protest delegation before Interior Secretary Fred Seaton during a hearing into the National Park Service's proposal to put tolls on the parkway beginning June 1.
