## Hodges Sees School Plan For Future

RALEIGH (UPI) -Gov. Luther H. Hodges predicted today that a school "incentive fund" similar to the proposed one killed by House and Senate Education com mittees will eventually have to

Hodges told a morning news conference he "was not surprised at the action of the committees" that killed a plan to set up a 10 million fund as an incentive for improving education on the local level. The bill died by more than 5\_1 vote in both committees.

"I'm a patient man," Hodges said, and indicated he would wait for the state to adopt such a pro\_

session of the Big Four conference by Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko, apparently after receiving new instructions from Premier Nikita Khrushchev The Russian draft treaty was not new. In fact, it was published

by the Soviets last Jan. 10 and quickly rejected by the West as unacceptable. But it was the Soviet Union's
