

Herter is not accep_ table as a package.

Diplomatic sources reported the West now is preparing an "in_ terim arrangement" which would maintain Western lifelines to Ber_ lin under a U. N. guarantee.

German Recognition To prevent any incident that might start trouble during nego_ tiations on the package plan, the East Germans would be recog_ nized as "agents" of the Soviet government in maintaining com_ munications to Bellin. Western troops would remain in the city for negotiations with the Soviets
