MOSCOW (UPI) - Premier Nikita Khrushchev told a group of American businessmen in an interview made public today that the Geneva foreign ministers' conference will succeed "or we would not have agreed to participate."

But Khrushchey compared the West's package peace plan with Noah's Ark.

"It contains all sorts of animals, clean and upclean," he said. Khrushchev met for two hours Tuesday with 40 visiting business and professional men from Miami. He told them the Western leaders "propose that East Germany give up its capital in East Berlin." "It is supposed that East Ger-

many will transfer its capital to Jupiter or Mars?" he asked. "No reasonable person can hope (Continued On Page Six)
