Search For Jet Fuel Given Up

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The government today wrote off its search for "exotic" new jet fuel for future atomic bombers despite an investment of more than 200 nullion dollars in the project.

The Air Force closed out its 110 million dollar high - energy fuel program with an announcement late Monday and the Navy was ready to announce that it would shut down the Callery chemical plant at Muskogee, Okla.

The Navy plant is a 38 million dollar facility and, according to official sources, other Navy expenditures on "zip" fuels over the years would put that service's investment at more than 100 million
