Miss Jane Rae Cranford of Lillington and Ernest William Schwarz of Philadelphia, Pa. and Aberdeen, Md. were married on Sunday, August 9th at 5:30 p. m. in the Lillington Methodist Church.

The bride is the only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Ray Cranford of Lillington, who received immediately following the ceremony at a reception for 200 guests at the Lillington Community Center. The bridegroom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Charles Schwarz of Philadelphia, Pa.

The Rev. Wayne Wegwart, pastor of the bride, officiated at the double ring ceremony assisted by the Rev. Lawrence Loy of Rowland, former pastor. Wedding musicians were Robert Mann, organist of Cumberland, Md. and Miss Judith Womble of Lillington, soloist who rendered a program of music by Chopin.

Johnny Spears and Russ Bradley served as ushers for the candlelight ceremony.

The bride, given in marriage by her father, wore a formal gown of white silk organza fashioned on princess lines with folds of the bouffant skirt caught at the waist with an organza bow. 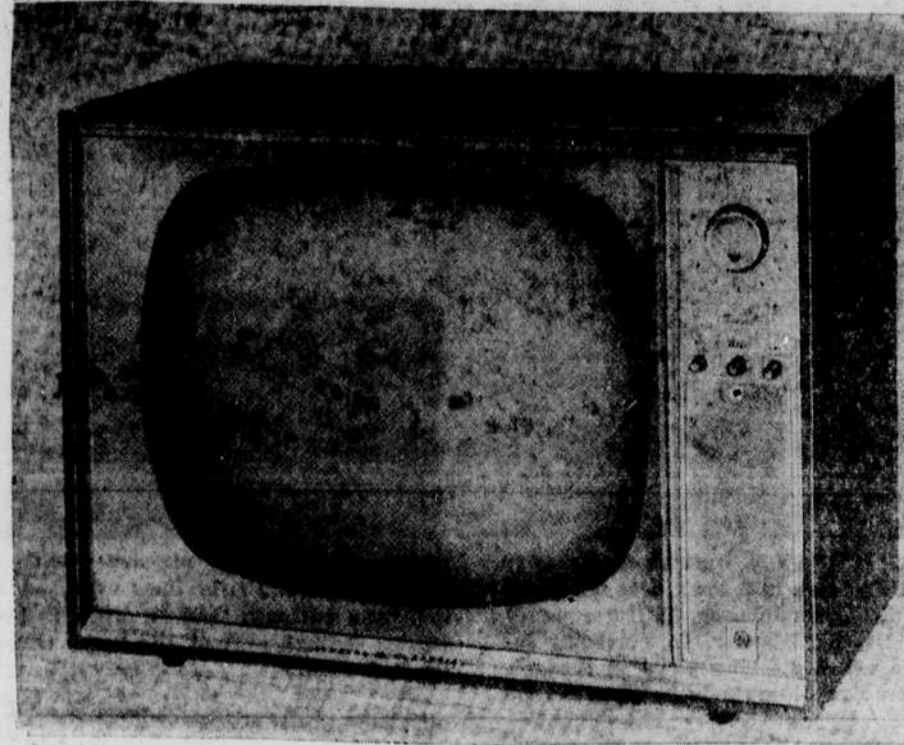
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
