'Tax Empting Bad Precedent'

Blalock Blasts Old Contract Forecast At

Mayor George Franklin Blalock heated up in spite of the crisp weather, spoke out sharply today against an action of the previous city administration.

He said he was doubtful of the legality and sure of a bad precedent having been set in the way the previous board had handled the leasing of parking lot space.

Blalock's anger was aroused by the discovery that, in making a contract with Harold Jernigan, owner of half the property on which the parking lot is established, the board, in effect, exempted him from paying taxes on the

"Besides his \$100 a month rent" said Blalock, "they agreed to take over payment of taxes on the lot, too-a payment of some \$58 a

"Now that's a large amount unless you want to compare it with what a very average unprosperous citizen would pay in his taxes and then it becomes a big amount

"The point is that the lot is not paying its proportionate share of the taxes levied in he city. I don't think it's legal though maybe the city attorney has fixed it up in a

Blalock said that the same provision did not apply to the other half of the parking lot, rented to the city by Dr. Glenn Hooper, (Continued On Page Six)


The fact was that Lonnie had got the jump on ATU men from Dunn and Fayetteville who were also preparing to move in on an outfit near Linden.
