### 10 Men Aboard Bomber On West Coast Flight PORTLAND, Ore. (UPI) - A Navy patrol bomber with 10 men

A spokesman for the 3045th Air Rescue Squadron at Portland said two Navy planes and six helicopters were hunting the Neptune this morning.

They were hampered by "miserable" cloudy and rainy weather with a ceiling of 1,000 to 2,000

The search centered around Mt. St. Helens in southwestern Washington, where the missing craft was last seen about 7 p. m.


