

## **Fighter Planes** Zooming Low, **Fire Warning**

ALGIERS, Algeria (JPI) -The French army clashed with French civilian extremists in open warfare in Algiers today with bazookas, mortars, machine guns and Molotov cocktail bombs. Flashes of searing guniire light-

ed up the pre-dawn sky. Moslems cowering in their homes dubbed the fierce action "the white night."

The battle started about 9 o'clock Thursday night with attacks on French troops by commandos of the Secret Army Organization (OAS). It stopped four huors later, but began again at 2:40 a. m. today.

It appeared to be the biggest operation to date by the OAS to sabotage the French - Algerian cease - fire. It came as France's Mediterranean fleet steamed toward Algeria. The battle flared in all parts of

Algiers, including the OAS stronghold of Bab-el-Oued where French troops defied an OAS warning to, keep out or be regarded as "troops of a foreign power." There were no reports of Mos-
