

LONDON (UPI) - Prime Minister Harold Macmillan indicated tonight that he intends to lead the Conservative party at the next general election despite demands for his resignation.

Macmillan indicated this in an exclusive interview with the Independent Television News.

The opposition Labor party has demanded that Macmillan resign and new elections be held. The Prime Minister must call a genetal election before October, 1964.
