## Board Deadlocks On Coroner

Failure of the county board of commissioners Monday to appoint W. A. (Bill) Warren of Erwin, one of their own members, as Harnett's coroner today was attracting wide political speculation throughout the county.

The Daily Record learned today that the board deadlocked in a tie vote, with Warren receiving two votes and Assistant Coroner Paul Drew getting two votes.

Commissioner Warren, now serving his third term on the board, had been unanimously endorsed by the Harnett Democratic Executive Committee to fill out the unexpired term of the late Governor R. L. (Bob) Taylor of Erwin.

Furthermore, Warren says he had a majority of the four other members of the board committed to him, even before the executive committee recommendation, and his appointment had been expected to be a mere formality.

But it didn't come off. The matter of filling the coroner's vacancy was delayed until the last item of business at the all-day meeting of the county's executives.

When it came up, Chairman Lofton A. Tart excused Commissioner Warren from the meeting, along with County Manager Neil McK. Ross and Mayor Harrison, registrar of deeds, to the board. Chairman Tart and Commissioner Warren left by way of Lillington.

Delayed until 2:30 p.m. After the meeting ended some time later, Commissioner Warren was informed that action on the appointment had been postponed until August 28th, when the board is scheduled to hold a special session on calling a school consolidation bond election.

No reason for the delay was given except that the board simply wasn't ready to make the appointment.

"I'm naturally quite disappointed," said Warren, but he took the delay good naturedly and pointed out, "I know how those things are and I certainly believe the board should have all the time it feels it needs. I am sure those fellows will do the right thing."

Just what took place during the executive meeting isn't known. Details were hard to come by, few and far between. One commissioner said they had agreed not to discuss the matter.

It was learned that three other applicants for the post were considered. They were: Assistant Coroner Paul Drew, who Court Clerk Elizabeth Matthews has designated to continue serving until the post (Continued on Page Six)

## Common Market Poultry Action Now In Dispute

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States announced today it will take retaliatory measures against imports from European Common Market countries for increased duties placed on American poultry by the Western European economic bloc.

Christian A. Herter, Kennedy's special representative for trade negotiations, would withdraw tariff concessions it has made on items such as the Common Market countries' \$6 million in export trade with the United States per year.

Hearings to determine the extent of U.S. tariff increases will begin Sept. 4.

Herter issued a list of 19 items from which the United States, after public hearings, will select those on which to withdraw the concessions it has made to Common Market exporters.

The biggest single item is wine, accounting for \$22.4 million in sales per year to the United States. The next largest item is made up of trucks and buses on which sales by Common Market countries to the United States are \$14.8 million per year. Other principal items include photographic papers, film, gelatin, brandy and electric shavers.

Herter said the United States "regrets" that the Common Market has refused "to reduce the current very high level of protection on poultry imports" into the area.

# Dunn City Council Faces Busy Session

In addition to action on Subdivision Regulations, Dunn's city council Wednesday night will take up a variety of other routine matters.

Following is the agenda, as released today by City Manager Archie Uzzle:

Resolution of levy and assessment for paving on Granville St. from Jackson St. to Johnson St. (old Jonesboro Rd.)

Resolution of levy and assessment for paving on Bay St. from Clinton Ave. to Wilson Ave.

## Mayor To Ask Godwin To Disqualify Self

Dunn's city council Wednesday night will vote on a new subdivision regulation recommended by the city planning board which would discontinue the town's practice of paying half the cost of utilities in new subdivisions.

Mayor George F. Blalock has called the matter one of the most important issues before the town in years and has urged a large outpouring of citizens to attend to see "which members of the council vote for their own pocket-books or for the best interests of the town."

It was a major issue in the recent mayor's contest.

## Cross Burned Here Last Nite

A four-foot cross was burned last night about 10:30 in front of Fayette's Funeral Home on East Harnett Street.

O. S. Payton, the owner, told Police Chief Alton Cobb one of his employees looked out, saw the cross burning and four young boys watching it burn. He said they got into a maroon car and speeded off.

He said he didn't know if they were the ones who erected the cross and set fire to it or if they simply stopped to see what was burning. Payton, prominent Dunn Negro leader, said he was at a loss to understand it. He said he had never had trouble with anybody in either race.

Belief was expressed it was the work of pranksters. The cross, 28 inches wide and four feet high, was made of two by fours wrapped in burlap and soaked with gas.

## Felder Loses Appeal To School Board

The Harnett County Board of Education has denied a renewed request from the Rev. B. B. Felder that his two daughters be assigned to the all-white Magnolia Avenue elementary school here.

The Rev. Mr. Felder, head of the local NAACP chapter, today received via registered mail the unanimous decision of the board.

Turned down at the July meeting, he appealed and was given a hearing. At the hearing, he heard his appeal an entirely different grounds from those stated in the original application. For that reason, the board ruled it could not be granted.
