Gang Robs on an all-mail train, or traveling

post office, in the 125 years of their history in Britian. First, the robbers jumped the signalmen on that section of the line and set the block signals at "danger," bringing the mail train to a halt three miles from Laigh-

ton Buzzard. When the fireman, David Whitby, 26, climbed down from the cab of the diesel engine to investigate, he was attacked and overcome by two of the bandits.

The engineer, Jack Mills, then was seized. The robbers swiftly and expert-

ly uncoupled the engine and first two mail cars, and forced Mills at gunpoint to drive them a mile down the track to where their compatriots were waiting.

There, Whitby and Mills were handcuffed together. The bandits, their faces covered with silk stockings, were armed with crowbars and blackjacks. They quickly broke open the doors of the sealed mail cars and subdued the four postal employes working in-

side Then the gang grabbed the 120 sacks of mail, which were be lieved to include old bank notes on their way to being destroyed and diamonds destined for London jewel markets. With the loot loaded aboard the trucks and the passenger car, the bandits scattered before the robbery was discovered by the en-

gineer of another train passing in the opposite direction. Police promptly threw up roadblocks over a wide area.


