## Man Cleared In Fatality

A Harnett County coroner's jury has ruled that Purvis Halford Arnold, 16, and Dennis Martin Bowling, 12, both of whom were killed when thrown out of a convertible on a rural paved road near Duncan on Sunday, July 28, came to their death as a result of negligence on the part of Purvis Halford Arnold.

The jury at the same time exonerated James Earl Hair, 23, of Sanford of any blame in the fatal accident. Hair was the driver of a car which the Arnold automobile passed about 10:24 a. m. The Arnold car went out of control and overturned when it passed the Hair car on the Christian Light-

Baptist Grove road about four miles south of Duncan community.

Ricky Vann Bowling, who was not thrown from the car, suffered minor injuries. He testified at the inquest that Purvis Arnold was the driver of the car. Other witnesses included Trooper J. H. Gwaltney.

## Lillington Church Plans Expansion

Plans were approved at a congregational meeting at Lillington Methodist Church Sunday to remodel the church sanctuary by enlarging it and adding air conditioning.

A representative number of the 331 members of the local congregation unanimously approved plans submitted by a special committee who had been working for three years to prepare the same.

The pastor, the Rev. C. F. Grill, presented the committee's plans to extend the present sanctuary into an unfinished area behind the chancel which was built as a connecting wing to the new educational building.

This will add 16 feet and provide room for eight more pews, accommodating 50 more people in the seating capacity of the church. The plan also provides for modernization of the sanctuary to make it more worshipful, and air conditioning.
