**Even though we are in the midst of the tobacco season maybe we can devote just a moment to hog production.**

No county in this area is in a more favorable position as far as the profitable production of swine is concerned. We, in Harnett county, are fortunate in that we can market feeder pigs on top hogs within the borders of our own county.

In just a few days Dunn Meat Packers, Inc. will begin buying and slaughtering hundreds of hogs daily. We expect this locally owned plant to save thousands of dollars annually for hog producers in Harnett and adjoining counties. Swine production has had and will continue to have an important role in North Carolina agriculture. Since there are such a large number of small farms in North Carolina and many farmers are profitably employed only part of the year, a swine enterprise can enable these farmers to use their limited acreage and excess labor to good advantage.

We can triple our hog production in Harnett County. The demand for pork is much larger than it was 40 years ago. People are eating more pork in all states of the nation, and our population as a nation is increasing. Therefore the demand for pork should continue to increase.

Whether we produce enough top quality hogs in our area to supply a large portion of this demand will depend to a large extent on our progressiveness in the swine industry. We have the climate, land, know-how, feed, markets, and potential markets in Harnett County to enable us to increase our hog production.

Hog prices over the past few years have been more stable. We don't find the wide fluctuation in prices that we once had. Since transportation to distant markets is both time consuming and costly in terms of transportation expense and driftage, with markets close at hand we can expect a higher net return from our hogs.

## Agriculturally Speaking

Now is a good time to expand or get into the hog business. The potential is great. A small investment in a swine enterprise will not only yield returns within a few months but, with good management, will continue to yield profits into the future.

## Pig Sale Is Successful

The Quality Feeder Pig Sale held on August 7, at the Harnett Livestock Market, was the most successful in my opinion we have had in the past 14 months since the market started. O. R. Ammond, county extension chairman, said today.

This particular Quality Feeder Pig Sale was very high in quality. Animals offered to buyers and buyers responded with fine cooperation in purchasing these pigs.

Another indication of the quality of this sale was all that sold on the sale went to local hogs in the general area.

There were some 275 pigs sold averaging 85% points for \$15.00 per head. For a total of some \$4,000. Fifty-five five pound pigs averaged \$45.00, twenty four pound pigs averaged \$18.40, seventy four pound pigs averaged \$18.50 and pigs averaging 84% sold for \$30.00.

Growers who have pigs ready are reminded that the next sale will be Wednesday August 21 at 1:00 P. M. in the Harnett Livestock arena. Purchasers who are interested in high quality feeder pigs are invited to attend this sale which is held twice monthly.

Pigs from above sale originated in Harnett, Cumberland, Moore, Sampson and Wake counties.
