Empty Mail Bags Found On **Secluded Farm**

LONDON (UPI) - Police found he hideout of the mail train robery gang today about 72 hours fter the bandits had fled with the loot of more than \$7 million rom history's biggest holdup. Scotland Vard disclosed the deout was discovered about 11 m, on a secluded farm 42 miles northwest of London.

"Empty mail bags" were found said Commander George Hatherill, deputy commander of Scot-The hideout was a brick house

called Leatherslade farm, about 23 miles, from the scene of last raday's robbery at Chedding-

Hatherill said the house looked as through the gang had left "in rather a hurry."

"There were a lorry truck and two Landrovers (Jeep-like rehibles outside.) A pit had been dug. It looked as though they intended to bury the stuff." the commander

Hatherill said no money was found at the hideout, but that ome mailbags had been located. He said the hideout "resembled an empty cottage." He said it located some distance from main roads and warned that powould keep the area sealed for two or three days while stigations were carried out. Hatherill said he already had ordered a team of finger-print experts to the house.
