Final Approval Of Tax Bill

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The reasury said today that the taxcut bill holds promise of fatter dividend checks for corporation stockholders and the extra payments could easily total \$1.5 billion a year.

It made the statement in a report designed to convince memers of Congress that every stockholder would wind up with "higher after-tax income" even though imposed on dividend income of big stockholders.

The far-ranging tax bill would cut taxes of individuals and corperations by \$11 billion in two annual steps. It passed the House on a 271-155 roll call nine days ago and is pending now before the Senate Finance Committee.

Although ultimate approval seems assured, the snail-like pace at which the Finance Committee began moving Thursday increased doubts that the administration would succeed in pushing it to final passage this year,
