

1/2 teaspoon salt 4cups milk (Scalded)

1/2 cup sugar 1 tablespoon vanilla Wash rice in cold water and drain. Add 11/2 cups boiling water and cook in a double boiler with tightly covered lid for 30 minutes. After 30 minutes water should be completely absorbed. Place rice in a large baking dish. Add sugar and salt to the scalded milk and pour over rice. Mix well, Bake in 350 degrees oven for 30 minutes. Stir and continue baking for an additional 30 minutes. Remove from oven, add vanilla and stir. Mixture will be thin, but thickens as it cools, Serve cold,


WMC Entertains Husbands Mon. The Women's Missionary Coun-
