Want Real Old Fashioned Dessert? Try Rice Pudding

For an old fashioned dessert, try rice pudding. In grandmother's day cold rice pudding was the dessert. The creamy mixture was inexpensive to make and a favorite in many households.

Frozen ready-to-serve desserts and packaged mixes have replaced old fashioned recipes, because of lack of time to prepare foods in our busy and hurried way of life.

There is a bit more to this recipe than other rice puddings, but the creamy real goodness is well worth it.

RICED PUDDING
1/2 Cup rice
1 1/2 cups boiling water

1/2 teaspoon salt
4 cups milk (Scalded)
1/2 cup sugar
1 tablespoon vanilla
Wash rice in cold water and drain. Add 1 1/2 cups boiling water and cook in a double boiler with tightly covered lid for 30 minutes. After 30 minutes water should be completely absorbed. Place rice in a large baking dish. Add sugar and salt to the scalded milk and pour over rice. Mix well. Bake in 350 degrees oven for 30 minutes. Stir and continue baking for an additional 30 minutes. Remove from oven, add vanilla and stir. Mixture will be thin, but thickens as it cools. Serve cold.
