

Uzzle Discusses Traffic Control

It has come up since a recent wreck at an intersection where there are no stop signs, yield signs, or other traffic control signs, that people living along certain well-traveled streets in Dunn had assumed that since there was more traffic on these well-traveled streets than on cross-streets, the traffic on the well-traveled streets had the right-of-way over the traffic on the cross streets. This just is not so as anyone knows who has read his Driver Instruction Manual published by the State Motor Vehicle Department for our help in passing our drivers test. This book plainly states the law on this which is: When two vehicles arrive at an intersection at the same time, the car to a driver's right has the right-of-way.

STOP signs mean nothing to a great number of people. This is very discouraging, and very dangerous, as it causes wrecks. When the leaders and others who know better pay no attention whatever to a STOP sign, others will follow suit. How can we expect teenagers to develop into safe drivers with the example set by older drivers. The same thing for YIELD signs, and even for traffic lights, as for STOP signs.

Do you know of any corners in Dunn where shrubbery, trees and other obstructions make for dangerous driving conditions at these intersections. The Dunn Board of Commissioners would like to have your list of such corners, and any recommendations you may wish to make on the promotion of traffic safety.

PARKING

The other day a leading merchant of Dunn pointed out two cars parked in front of a fellow merchant's store and said: "See those two cars?" Well, two people work around the corner at another place of business, but they come early every morning and park and take up those two spaces all day long, that customers could be using. The store owner doesn't have but about four spaces in front of his store, and half of them are monopolized by these two fellow businessmen. The speaker then said there ought to be a policy adopted by the merchants' organizations of Dunn that all members of the Chamber of Commerce make a pledge not to park in front of their own or their fellow businessmen's places of business and that there would be a \$5.00 charge levied against every businessman violating this pledge, each and every time he violates it. This makes sense, as anyone working in Dunn can park all day where there are no parking meters and not have to walk more than two blocks. This would leave spaces in the business section for customers and should be a great help. The walking would also make meals taste better.

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Record Boosts UNICEF Cause

NEW YORK (UPD) — A new long - playing record album with a galaxy of American talent went on the market this week to benefit the U. N. Children's Fund (UNICEF) and the U. S. Committee for the United Nations.

The unusual disc, entitled "Three Billion Millionaires" was conceived as the first musical comedy ever created expressly for the record medium. Composer Robert Allen traveled 37,000 miles to record the musical portions of the record.

The album is a fantasy of the seating of a baby at the United Nations as a representative of the future generation. Among those in the cast are U. N. delegate Adlai E. Stevenson, Judy Garland, Danny Kaye, Sammy Davis, Jr., Carol Burnett, Bing Crosby, Wally Cox, Jack Benny, Terry - Thomas, George Maharis, and Nancy Baker.

Arnold Michaels, who produced the prizewinning "Adlai Stevenson Reports" TV show, is producer and narrator of the album and Peter Farrow and Diane Lambert wrote the book and lyrics. All the artists and writers contributed their services and royalties.

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
