Tips On Freezing Pumpkin

Thoughts of pumpkins bring to mind the pilgrims, harvest, jack-o-lanterns and pies. If you think only that far you are missing something. Pumpkin has additional uses of every day value.

Although a pumpkin will keep well in dry storage for months, it is convenient to have it in meal - size portions ready to heat and eat anytime you want it and that is easy to do.

. Take your favorite variety of pumpkins, cut it into strips; peel it; cut in small pieces, add one cup of sorgum molasses to each gallon pumpkin. Put in a pot with slowly and stir it occasionally so that it will not burn. Cook it to the consistency that you like. Chill it: put it in any good frozen food container and freeze it. This is ne of several ways of preparing pumpkin to freeze. You may want to bake yours,

Once the pumpkin is in the freezer you have it at arm's reach to heat and eat when you want it.

You may cheat yourself if you spice all of it and use it just for ples It is delicious with sausage, ham or crisp bacon for break-fast. Just heat it in the frying pan after you have poured out the fat or part of it. It is beautiful on the breakfast plate. It is equally as good served as a vegetable for lunch or dinner.

You may prefer the small - deep colored sugar pumpkin. It is fine grained and often used for family fare. You may want to add white sugar or brown sugar instead of the molasses.





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


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
