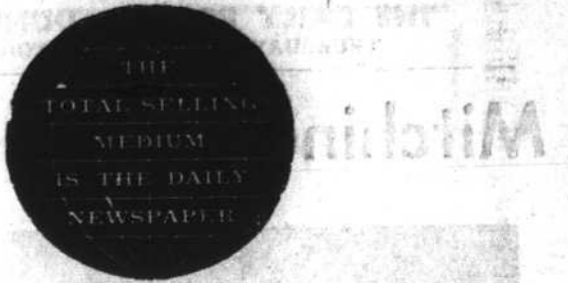

Billy Warns Sex Can Be Fatal Error

HOUSTON, Tex. (UPI) — Evangelist Billy Graham used the suicide of actress Marilyn Monroe Wednesday to illustrate the importance of obedience of moral laws.

Graham said Miss Monroe's death showed that "sex goddesses are not happy." He told 5,000 students of Houston Baptist College that "hundreds of you here would like to try and think you can overcome the odds."

"But if you break the moral laws," Graham said, "there is no sin which will destroy you quicker."

"Sex can be a flaming fire for good in your life if used properly."

Graham plans a "crusade for Christ" here in the autumn of 1965 at a domed athletic stadium which is under construction.

Baby Walks At Age Of Just 2 Weeks

LONG BEACH, Calif. (UPI) — Parents of a two-week-old baby claimed Thursday (today) the infant began walking at two weeks but explained that two other sons walked at the same age.

Medical men were invited by Mr. and Mrs. Stuart Beutel to visit them at their home and see for themselves.

Roger Eric Beutel was born Oct. 16 and weighed 6 pounds 5 1/2 ounces. He can support his own weight but walks with a slight stoop and doesn't have much stamina, the parents said.

The Beutel's explained they were pleased with Roger's progress but said brothers Kim, 6, and Mark, 3, took their first steps at two weeks.

Dr. George Trimble of Long Beach Memorial Hospital said records show the earliest verified age of a walking baby was 27 weeks.

Solon Finds Sex More Interesting Than Government

Two Call Girls Employed On Staff Of One U.S. Senator

WASHINGTON (UPI) — At the age of 59, Rep. Tom Steed has just discovered that sex is more interesting to people than government.

The Shawnee, Okla., Democrat casually announced Wednesday that he had discovered two call girls on the payroll of a senator. He did not identify the senator, and said he would not do so, even if called before congressional investigators.

"I'm not taking a moralistic position about it," he said. "I only mention it to point up the fact that secrecy in congressional matters operates to the benefit of nobody but a few of the members. It certainly is not in the interest of the people."

Steed, a newspaperman for 30 years before his election to Congress in 1948, included the call girl report in his latest blast at the Senate for its insistence that House members give up the use of

so-called "junk" or unaddressed mailings under their franking privilege.

Clean Own House "People who live in glass houses shouldn't throw stones," Steed said. "If the senators want to reform things around here they ought to start with the Senate."

He said the Senate's system of publishing members' payrolls quarterly lends itself to abuse. He said senators in some cases apparently do not list everyone they should. House members' payrolls are constantly open to public inspection.

More important, in Steed's view, is the preservation of "comity" between the two Houses, a traditional system under which each chamber makes its own rules without advice from the other.

Steed said he had been complaining since June, when the Senate added its anti-junk mail rider to a House-passed appropriation bill to run the House and

Senate for the current 12-month period.

Sex More Interesting "But I just discovered today that sex is more interesting to people than government," he said. "Nobody paid any attention until I mentioned call girls."

Yes, how about those call girls? he was asked.

When, where, and how did he meet them, and how did he know what they were and who they work for?

"I stumbled into the wrong paw one night," Steed replied, recalling a social gathering where he met the girls earlier this year. "It became obvious what they were in the course of the conversation. And they told me whose payroll they were on."

Are they still on the senator's payroll? "There is no way for me to know," Steed replied.
