

PEINE, Germany (UPI)-Three the decompression chamber men trapped more than a week in a flooded iron mine rode a steel capsule one at a time to the sur-

Officials said they went directly into a decompression chamber on top of the mine to prevent them from getting a case of the "bends" following their long ordeal under high air pressure,

Rescue worker Paul Syska went down in the capsule first through a 262-foot escape shaft punched through to the miners by an American-made drill early today in a precision operation .He helped them into the 10-foot-long capsule and they rode to the surface one at a time.
