

Witnesses Hear Bruce Griffin

"The Bible Triumphs in a Scientific World" was the climactic lecture of a three-day assembly of Jehovah's Witnesses held in Farmville Sunday when Bible authority Bruce E. Griffin of New York spoke to the conference.

Several delegates from Dunn, headed by M. O. McLamb, local minister, heard Griffin say, "The Bible does not conflict with proved science but only with unproved science. So whether they realize it or not the people who follow these theories have and are actually making a god of science."

McLamb said Mr. Griffin emphasized the point by using information from a Protestant journal, "Christianity Today," which said that a group of 25 Protestant and Catholic theologians in America named some new gods: physical power and comfort, financial security, prestige, sex, science, social status, atomic power and war.

Griffin said, "Following scientific theories has caused men to develop pride, egotism, selfishness and a desire to be independent of God which is hurtful and will lead to death."

In concluding his sermon, he urged all in attendance to "tear up of God and his purposes and you can share in the fulfillment of the Bible's wonderful promise of a righteous new world so near at hand."

According to Mr. McLamb, the 893 in attendance received some twelve hours of Bible instruction. "We strongly feel the information received on the Bible at this seminar will help all who attended to be more qualified to share the good news of God's Kingdom with the people in the Dunn area," he concluded.

Man Held

CHRISTINE DISCUSSES MEN

Lord Denning, without flinching, quotes writings by Christine in which she tells all, hides nothing - and gets big royalties for it. "Men are such fools," says Christine. "But I like them. I always have."

"One man," she wrote, who was foolish enough and irresponsible enough to have an affair with me was a Cabinet Minister, a member of Her Majesty's Government. And at the same time I was having an affair with a Russian diplomat.

"I believe," continues Christine, "that any man in his (Profumo's) position - particularly a married man - is both unwise and irresponsible to have an affair with some unknown girl like me. More especially so in this case because this Minister has such knowledge of the military affairs of the Western world that he would be one of the most valuable men in the world for the Russians to have had in their power."

And she caps it off with: "I believe now that a man in his position should not indulge in pastimes like me. I suppose even Cabinet Ministers are only human, but I think they should curb their feelings."

PROFUMO PAYS AND PAYS

As Christine said the Minister of War soon felt the folly of his ways. His private life was laid bare, even to publication of his "My Darling" note to Christine. He was actually forced to turn over all his bank statements and all his holdings for investigators to prove he hadn't paid Christine to leave the country.

And so it goes, for 114 pages in small print for a total of 343 paragraphs, simply signed, "Denning, Sept., 1963."

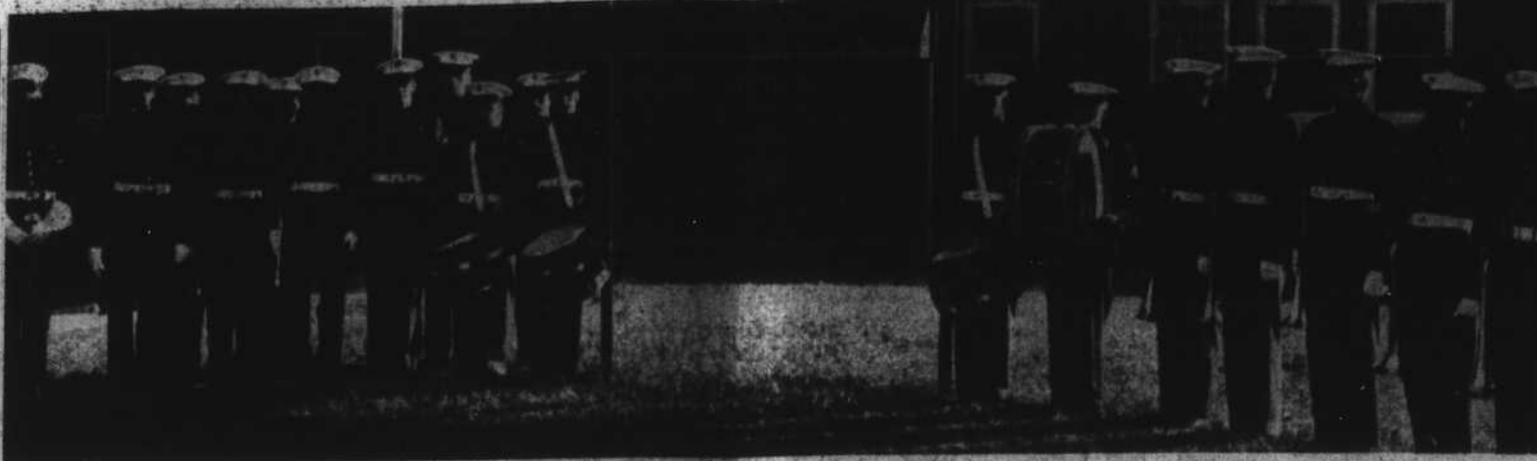

Indicted with Mrs. Gregory and still facing trial in the case are Jack Horsefield, 28, of Goldsboro, a special deputy sheriff who resigned his post in Wayne the day after the woman's death, and a friend, James Gray, 27, a salesman who allegedly arranged for Mrs. Gregory to perform the abortion.

Horsefield, alleged father of the child, is charged with procuring an abortion and conspiracy and Gray, who took him and Mrs. Brown to the Gregory home the night of March 15, is charged with conspiracy.

Lillington attorney Neil McK. Ross, attorney for Mrs. Gregory, said today he had planned to request postponement of the trial before he learned of her death.

FIRST 'AFFAIR' FOR EACH

Wayne Sheriff W. L. Adams described Horsefield as "an excellent officer with a spotless reputation" up until the time. He said Horsefield broke down after five hours of constant questioning and admitted he had an affair with Mrs. Brown. He said Horsefield told him Mrs. Brown threatened to expose their affair if he didn't arrange for the abortion.

Adams said Horsefield said it was his only act of infidelity since his marriage and Mrs. Brown said she had never been intimate with any other man besides Horsefield and her husband. The Sheriff said she made the statement a few hours before her death. Her husband, an airman formerly stationed at Goldsboro, abandoned her and their three children and the family had been receiving welfare aid, Sheriff Adams said.

Officers raided the Gregory home at 4 a.m. on Sunday morning after the woman's death, directed to it by Horsefield and Gray. They said Gray identified Mrs. Gregory and said he had given her five \$20 bills, which Horsefield was to repay later.

At first, officers said, Mrs. Gregory denied the visit but after the search turned up abortion instruments she admitted they had taken the woman there. She denied performing the abortion, but admitted giving Mrs. Brown the instruments and instructing her how to use them.

Surviving her mother and stepfather, Mrs. Edgar Mason of Erwin, the husband, John E. Erwin; three sons, Paul Mack, Porter, and Coy Junior Porter, both of Erwin, and William J. Porter of Greeley, Colo.; two brothers, John Ryan of Route 1, Bunnlevel, and Thomas Ryan of Erwin; two half sisters, Mrs. Zora Hall of Norfolk, Va., and Mrs. Ruby Davis of Erwin; also nine grandchildren.

Her father was the late Cornelius Ryan. Funeral services are incomplete and will be announced by Cromartie Funeral Home.

YOUTHS FINED

HAIFA, Israel (UPI) - Eight youths, all Jewish religious zealots, were fined and given suspended jail sentences Monday for rioting in a Christian school in September.

They were given the choice of a \$175 fine or 60 days in jail and nine month suspended sentences. They were also placed under \$80 bond for three years against their good behavior.

General Utility Co. and W. Clayton Smith, official of Johnson Cotton Co., appeared to discuss complaints regarding smoke and traffic conditions at the town's two local cotton gins.

COLDEST TEMPERATURE

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Possibly the coldest temperature ever recorded in the earth's atmosphere minus 299.9 degrees Fahrenheit - was reported Monday by the federal space agency and Swedish researchers.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration and the University of Stockholm took the reading last August with a Nike-Cajun rocket. It attributed the low temperature to a high altitude cloud formation called noctilucent.

All have been renominated for reelection although Stockholders have the privilege of making nomination from the town.

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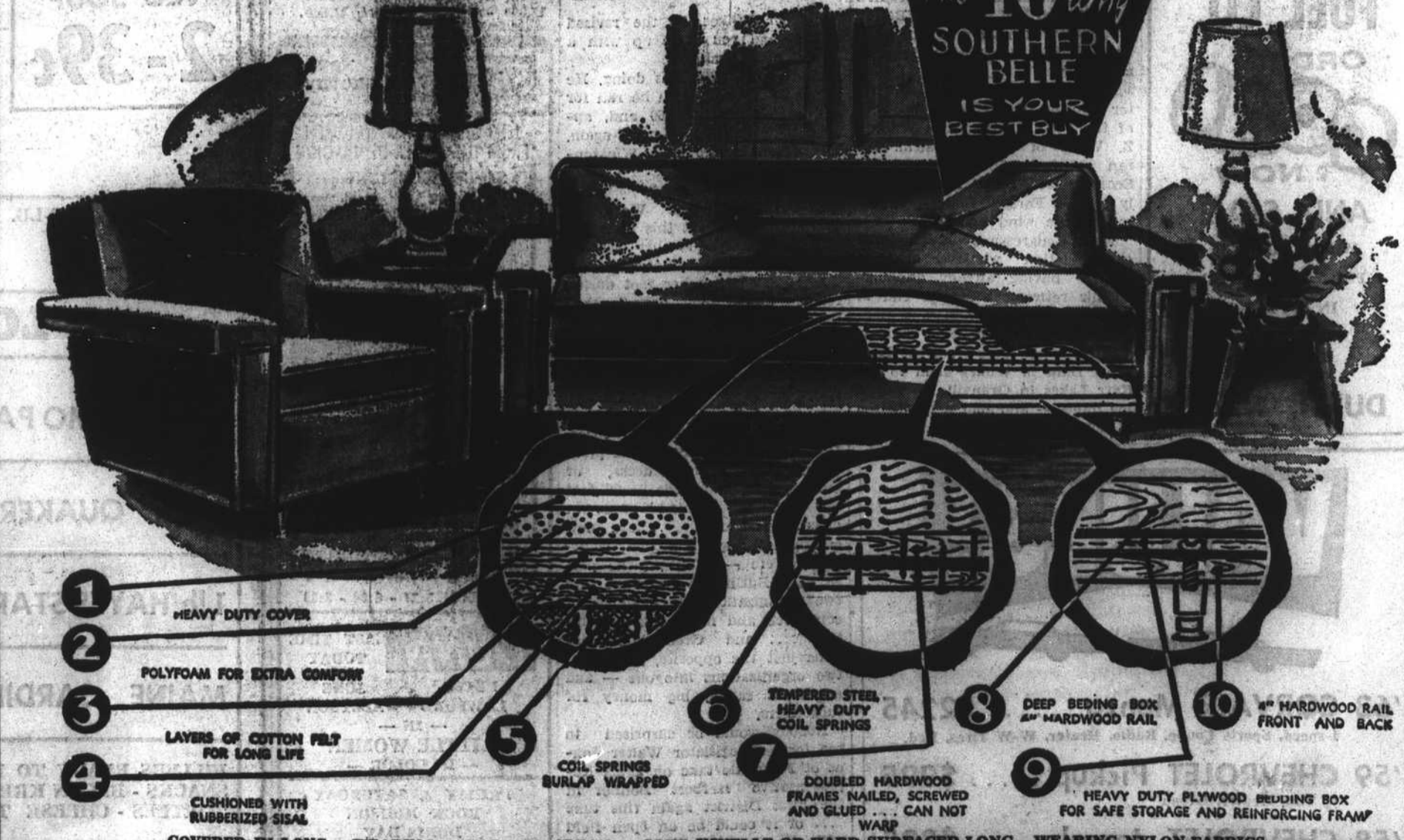
