## Wee Lynn Gordon Fetes Majorettes

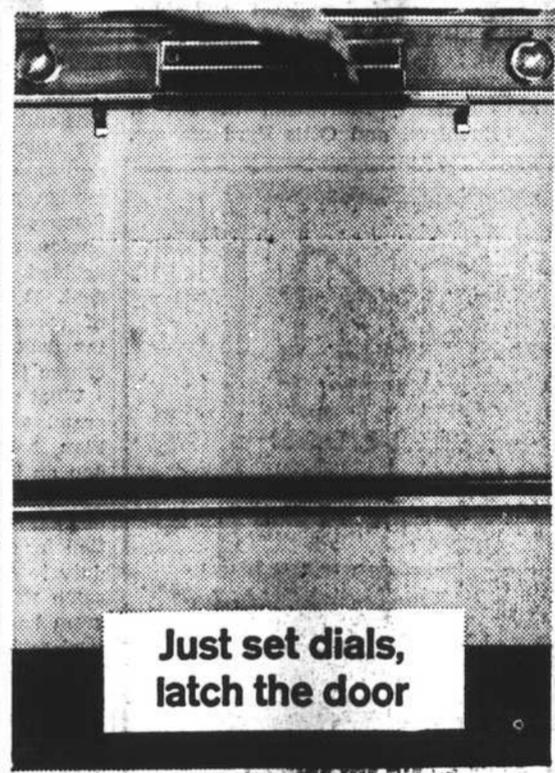
Wee Lynn Gordon entertained the Dunn majorettes Friday night prior to the Dunn-Staunton football game.

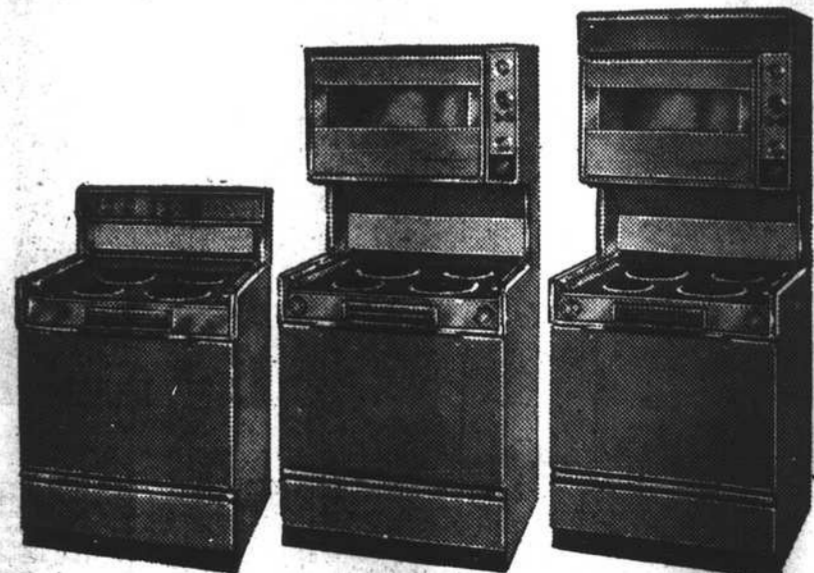
