Sampson, Johnston Due for Heavy Losses

Harnett Census Drop Due To Be Smaller Than Neighbors'

RALEIGH — North Carolina's population will exceed five and one-half million by 1980 if present trends continue. Approximately two-thirds of the predicted gain of 991,764 by 1980 in population over the official census of 4,566,155 in 1960 will occur in four counties — Mecklenburg, Guilford, Forsyth and Wake. Guilford's anticipated population will be 407,024 in 1980.

Net gains in population by 1980 are predicted for 52 of the state's 100 counties, with losses indicated for the remaining 48.

Harnett is one of the 48 counties expected to lose in population, along with the neighboring rural counties of Sampson and Johnston.

However, the loss predicted for Harnett is much smaller than the losses predicted for Johnston, Sampson and most of the other 48 counties.

Harnett's 1960 population of 48,236 is due to drop to 47,534 in 1970 and to 46,248 in 1980, a net loss of only 1988.

Sampson's 1960 population of 48,013 is projected to drop to 44,784 in 1970 and to 41,275 in 1980, a total loss of 6,738.

Johnston County, which adjoins Harnett to the north, is expected to suffer a heavy loss of 9,842 during these next 20 years. It is to drop from 62,936 in 1960 to 58,189 in 1970 and to 53,094 in 1980.

Indications are that the present industrial surge in Harnett, though only slight, may reverse the trend in Harnett. Rural areas will continue to lose, but towns in the county are expected to gain.

The militarized population of neighboring Cumberland is predicted to increase from 148,418 in 1960 to 212,095 in 1980, a whopping gain of 63,677 citizens.

Lee County, which borders Harnett on the west is slated to increase from its 26,561 population of 1960 to 33,739 in 1980, a net gain

of 7,078. Most of the increase of almost a million persons by 1980 is indicated in the urban Piedmont counties. Heavy population losses are predicted for some rural eastern and mountain counties with War-

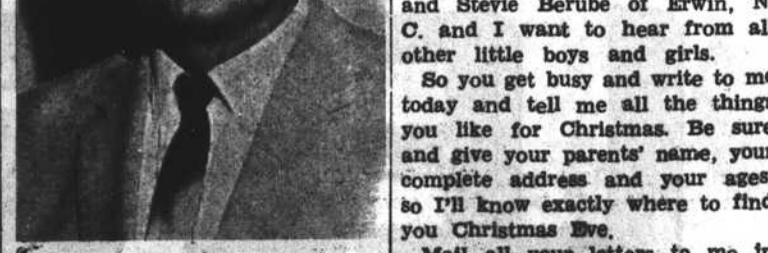
Brown Will Speak At Benson Event

Dallas Paper Says He, Oswald Were Neighbors

DALLAS (UPI) — The Dallas Morning News said today officers investigating the assassination of President Kennedy have information indicating Lee Harvey Oswald rented a room near Jack Ruby's home.

The newspaper said their information came from officers who said the Federal Bureau of Investigation and Secret Service believe they have confirmed reports that the two men were neighbors.

Neither the Secret Service nor the FBI have released any information on their investigation.

The officers, according to the newspaper, also have information that Ruby once had an apartment mate who had been active in Communist front groups. The News quoted an officer as saying "this could be the key that we have been seeking."

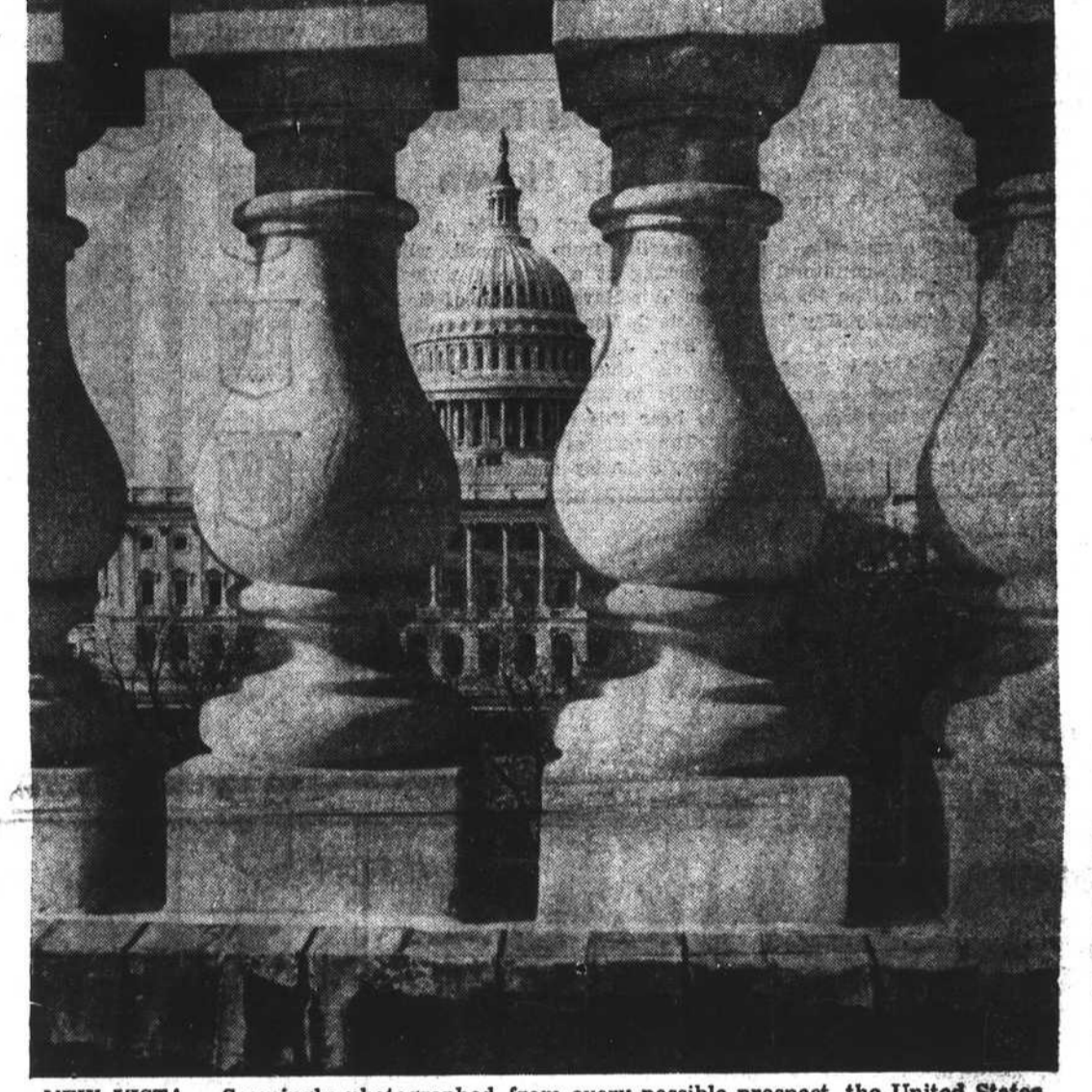
Dear Santa Claus

Second Dramatic Move In 24 Hours Castro Forces Hijack Plane

CARACAS, Venezuela (UPI) — Pro-Castro terrorists today hijacked a Venezuelan Airlines plane with 17 persons aboard and flew it to neighboring Trinidad.

The plane landed safely at Port of Spain's Placoe International Airport. Trinidad police, customs and security officials surrounding the plane and began questioning the occupants.

It was the second spectacular action staged within 24 hours by the so-called Armed Forces of the

National Liberation (FAIN). Wednesday, four heavily-armed men kidnaped U. S. Army Col. James K. Chenault, 45, of Sherman, Tex., at gunpoint outside of his home.

Ruby Calls From Jail: How's Biz With The Girlies?

DALLAS (UPI) — Dapper Jack Ruby wondered today what his friends think about the man who killed the suspected assassin of President Kennedy.

Ruby, 52, was charged with murder with malice in the slaying Sunday of Lee Harvey Oswald. He was held in maximum security without bond.

The pudgy striptease joint operator made two telephone calls Wednesday from county jail. He inquired how business was going at his two clubs and what his friends thought of him now.

Jailer E. L. Holman said Ruby called Cecil Hamlin, a friend, and asked what other friends thought of his actions. Hamlin assured him there were no ill feelings.

Ruby called Club Carousel and got a report from Andrew Armstrong, the bartender, that business had been slow.

"We had a pretty good crowd for Thanksgiving eve," Armstrong told UPI today.

Only about 50 persons turned out Tuesday night to see Joe Dale, "The Twist Girl" do her act to the boom-boom band. Armstrong said customers do not talk about the boss, "they just watch the girls."
