



Latin Nations Are Asked To Break Relations

CARACAS (UPI) - President Romulo Betancourt called Tuesday night for an air and naval blockade of Cuba to put a stop to the Castroite export of arms and revolution to other nations of the New World.

There was no immediate reacion from the United States, which presumably would have to furnish most of the forces required for such a blockade


At a news conference. Betancourt also urged the few Latin American nations which have not already done so to break relations with Premier Fidel Castro's revo lutionary regime.

The President's double-barreled attack on the Castroites was a secuel to last week's announcement that Venezuela has "difinite and irrefutable proof" that arms found cached on a Venezuelan beach last month were smuggled in from Cuba for use by Communist terrorits in this country.


