of Mrs. Sanders' three children. "Anybody who would do something like that - something that bad - ought to be put to death" Mrs. Sanders said. "To do that to a little girl is the worst kind

Mrs. Sanders, also a Negro. said Crawford, his mother and grandmother had pleaded with her

"I told them I would think about it, but I knew right then I wasn't going to write any letter to Governor Sanford or anybody," she said, "I didn't have any sympathy then. I don't have any now.

"The people around here want to see him executed," she added, "and so do I."
