Ought To Pay For Research

House Rules Committee today voted down legislation to authorize government research on how to make cigarettes safe.

Chairman Howard W. Smith D-Va., said the vote was 6 to 5 against clearing the legislation for a vote in the House,

The oill was recommended by Agriculture Committee in the aftermath of a government report linking smoking to lung cancer and other ailments.

The bill would authorize construction of a government laboratory, at a cost not stated but estimated at \$5 to \$10 million. It would seek out the harmful elements in cigarettes and try to find ways to eliminate them.

The measure had the backing not only of the industry but of the Public Health Service and had been expected to win easy clearance of the rules group, which acts as a traffic cop in routing legislation from other committees to the floor of the House.

However, Smith said one objection was raised both that the industry itself ought to finance the laboratory then, on the other hand he said there was objection that if it did, the findings would be


