

Polly Wilson Weds Ronald Lee Hanson

On Sunday afternoon at five o'clock in a formal candlelight ceremony at the Glad Tidings Church, Miss Polly Ann Wilson of Dunn and Ronald Lee Hanson of Racine, Wisconsin, were united in marriage. Officiating at the double-ring ceremony was the Rev. Thomas G. Wilson of Lakeland, Florida, brother of the bride.

The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cleon Thomas Wilson of this city and the bridegroom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Siegfried Hanson, Jr. 3408 North Green Bay Road, Racine, Wisconsin.

The wedding vows were spoken before the chancel upon which was centered a vast array of California chrysanthemums and gladioli, flanked by seven-branched brass candelabrum, holding burning white tapers. The brass prie-dieu covered in white satin was placed before the altar and a miniature bride's bouquet was placed to the side of the prie-dieu. Pyramid and spiral brass candelabrum on standards holding lighted white cathedral candles were used against a background of palms.

Wedding Music
A program of nuptial music was presented by Mrs. Mack M. Jernigan organist, and Glenroy Shedd, soloist, of Springfield, Missouri, brother-in-law of the groom. Before the ceremony Mr. Shedd sang "Ich liebe dich," by Grieg; "The Greatest of These is Love," by Bitgood; "O Perfect Love," by Barnby was sung as a benediction at the close of the ceremony. The Bridal Chorus from Lohengrin by Wagner was used as the professional and the Wedding March from Mendelssohn's Midsummer Night's Dream was used for the recessional.

The bride, given in marriage by her father, wore a formal gown of white bridal organza and chantilly lace, fashioned with a Sabrina scalloped neckline, long sleeves, tapering to points over the hands, a tight fitted bodice that was joined to a flat front skirt with controlled bell sides and a shepherdess back, finished with a bow at the waistline. The detachable Camelot train of chantilly lace with organza borders ended in a chapel sweep. Evenly divided motifs of chantilly lace were appliqued on the front of the gown. Her three-tiered veil of imported silk illusion was attached to a crown of seed pearls. She carried a white Bible cascaded with phalaenopsis orchids and stephanotis.

Attendants
Mrs. Thomas G. Wilson, sister-in-law of the bride, was the honor attendant. She wore a floor length dress of pink mist silk organza, fashioned with a scoop neckline, short sleeves and a full skirt. A flat bow of matching velvet with long streamers was attached at the neckline in the back. She wore a matching sheer picture hat and carried a cascade of petal pink daisies with pink Sensation Rosses. Serving as bridesmaids were Mrs. Glenroy Shedd, sister of the groom, Miss Constance Altman of Fayetteville, and Misses Andrea and Barbara Jo Wilson, nieces of the bride. Their dresses and hats were identical to that of the honor attendant and they carried cascades of petal pink daisies.

Best man, serving as ushers were: Robert Hanson of Racine, Wisconsin, brother of the groom, William Lemberg of Arlington, Virginia, uncle of the groom, Billy R. Johnson of Raleigh, Michael Morris of Newton Grove; Samuel E. Godwin, Jr. of Warsaw, Larry Godwin and Terry Godwin of Dunn, and Dale Godwin of Fayetteville, all cousins of the bride.

The bride's mother wore a street length dress of rose lace over organza, finished with a large organza bow at the side front. She wore a crushed pink silk organza hat to match the trim on her dress and matching shoes completed her outfit. Her corsage was a light hybrid orchid with a deep purple throat.

The mother of the groom chose a beige sheath of sheer bubble brocade silk with satin trim. Her hat and accessories were of matching shade and she also wore a light hybrid orchid with a purple throat.

For a wedding trip the bride changed to a navy silk suit with which she wore a navy velvet pillbox hat and matching accessories. Her corsage of white phalaenopsis orchids completed her outfit.

The bride and bridegroom are both seniors at Evangel College, Springfield, Missouri, and will both complete work on a Bachelor of Arts degree. Mrs. Hanson is an English major and Mr. Hanson is majoring in Business Administration.

After September 1, they will be at home at Garden Terrace Apartments, Springfield, Missouri.

The table centered with an all white three-tiered wedding cake topped with a wedding ring and orange blossoms, was flanked with silver candelabrum holding white tapers. Following the traditional cutting by the bride and groom, Mrs. Silas Alphin, aunt of the bride served the cake and Mrs. Everett Westberg, aunt of the groom, poured punch from a silver bowl in which was floating an ice ring centered with pink sweetheart roses. Guests were also served fruit cake nuts, mints, bell shaped sandwiches and cheese straws. Assisting in serving were Mrs. Oliver W. Godwin and Mrs. S. E. Godwin, aunts of the bride. Mrs. Billy R.
