

Releigh Tea Honors Deb

Miss Elaine Johnson Purdie, Dunn debutante, who will be presented at the Terpsichorean Ball Friday at the Raleigh Memorial Auditorium, was honored at a tea Friday given at the Sir Walter Hotel in Raleigh by her grandmother, Mrs. Nathan M. Johnson, Sr. Mrs. Johnson also honored Miss Mary Lindsey Smith, of Raleigh, leader of the 1964 Debutante Ball; Miss Ann Adair, Erwin debutante and Miss Victoria Doreen Yarborough, Durham debutante.

The party was held in the spacious Elizabeth Room of the hotel from 3:30 until 4:30. The Elizabeth Room was decorated throughout with stately palms and smilax vine interspersed with tall, seven-branched wrought iron holders with burning white candles. 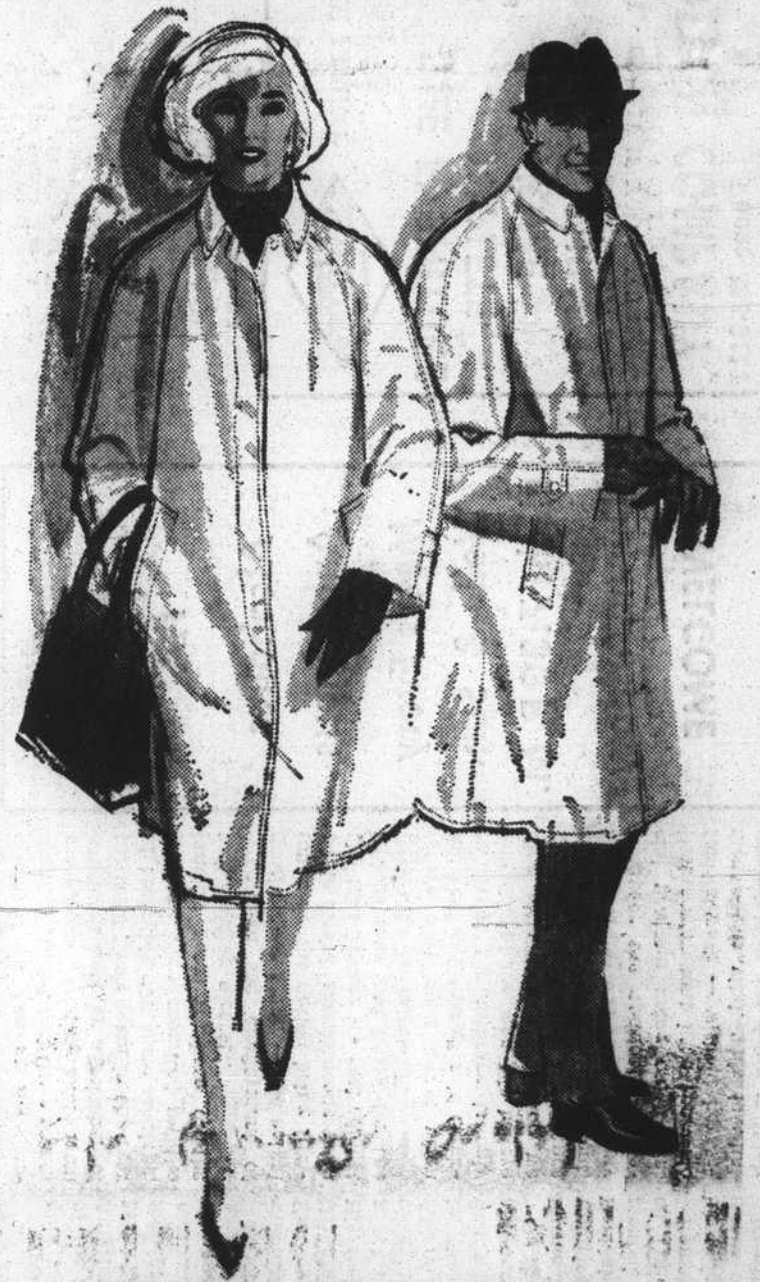
