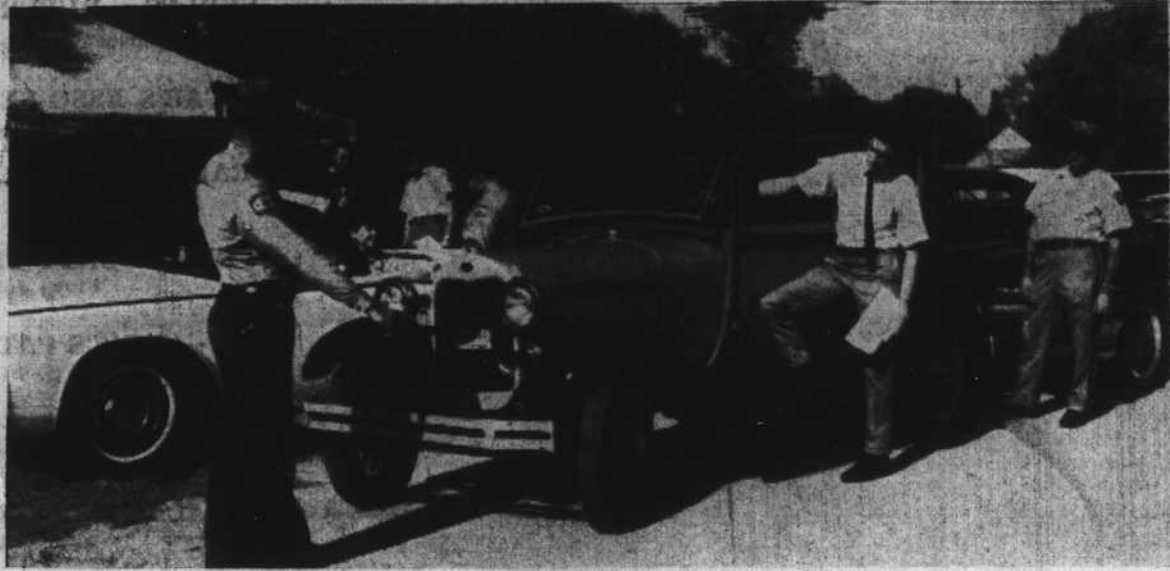

MIGHTIEST ROCKET NOW IN ORBIT

Dunn's Market Ranks Second In Averages

Dunn's rocketing tobacco market is second in the seventeen market Eastern belt in the highest averages of the season according to Department of Agriculture report. This gave Dunn's market a boost from third to second place in two days. Only one market has a higher season's average than Dunn and that market is also a smaller one. Dunn tops all of the giant markets. Dunn's market is also near the 5,000,000 pound mark in sales today as the market gets ready to close tonight for a sales holiday along with all other markets in the belt until next Thursday. Through yesterday, the market here had sold 4,289,994 pounds for a total of \$2,309,530.40. Yesterday alone the market sold close to 470,000 pounds for an average of \$55.72. Another 400,000 in sales in poundage was expected today.

Say Democrats Won't Be Led Astray

Henderson Plugs Hard For LBJ

After a whirlwind tour of the third Congressional District with gubernatorial candidate Dan K. Moore, Congressman David N. Henderson today predicted that the people of eastern North Carolina will take a look at the entire record of both major political parties and the total individual records of their presidential nominees before casting their votes in November. "Those who believe the election in eastern North Carolina will be decided upon a single issue are in for a big surprise," Henderson commented. "Our farmers know who they can depend on for a continuation of the tobacco program and a solution to their current problems. Our businessmen remember the recessions of the last administration as compared to the continued increase in business and business profits during this administration. Our taxpayers know who gave them the first meaningful cut they have had since the war. Our teachers and parents know which party has led the way in providing federal assistance for many different types of educational programs and industrial training. Our citizens know how few of their communities got new Post Offices during the Eisenhower years and how many of them have gotten new or extensively remodeled facilities since. Our town and county officials and taxpayers know which party sponsored the legislation which has provided them with federal assistance for water and sewer projects, matching funds for hospitals and aid for other worthwhile projects. Our wives and mothers know who has maintained the peace with firmness and dispatch but without needless provocation in this dangerous nuclear age. Our Republican candidates tell us what they are against but not what they are for. Their record is negative; their platform is negative; they are completely unable to think or speak in positive terms. It is easy to pick out flaws in what the other fellow is doing but it is quite another thing to do a better job yourself. Our people have too much good horse sense to be led astray by these negativists," Henderson concluded. "They will vote for a program rather than a protest."

"Just A Bunch of Complainers"

Sanford Ridicules Barry's Supporters

CHARLOTTE - Gov. Terry Sanford came to Charlotte Thursday and spent much of the day hurling wry barbs at the Republican Party in general and Sen. Barry Goldwater in particular. Goldwater's campaign speeches in North Carolina this week required no rebuttal from him, Sanford said. "He's been furnishing his own rebuttal." In ridiculing the Republican campaign approach, Sanford said: "They are trading on fear, on people who are dissatisfied - as comfortable as they are - because they don't think they're getting what they are entitled to." Republicans, Sanford said, are "born complainers," and Republican criticism is just another cross Democrats have had to bear as they move the country forward. "I don't mind their being dissatisfied," said the governor with a broad grin. "We've got to go through the rest of our lives hearing Republican criticism. I hope the criticism will continue year after year as the Democrats continue to do something for all the people." The governor said he was "satisfied that the Democratic candidate, Dan K. Moore, would carry on for the Sanford programs in education, roads and industrial development."

In Dunn Auto Accident Jury Awards \$5,000

A jury in Harnett Superior Court today returned a verdict awarding Malcolm McLeod of Lillington, Route 2, \$5,000 damages against R. Dennis Strickland, prominent Dunn business man as the result of an automobile collision. Strickland's daughter Sylvia Ann, a college student, was driver of an automobile that collided with one driven by McLeod at the corner of W. Vance St. and N. Ellis Avenue in Dunn on November, 19, 1961. The accident occurred near Miss Strickland's home. Evidence showed that the accident occurred as Miss Strickland came out of W. Vance Street. She testified that she was driving in a slow, prudent manner but did not see the other car. Both sides claimed contributory negligence. McLeod was confined to a hospital here for 21 days and at Duke Hospital for two months, and accumulated medical bills in excess of \$2,500. State Senator Robert B. Morgan and his law associate, Attorney Ed McCormick, offered as a witness Dr. Bill Erwin, a psychiatrist at Duke Hospital. He testified McLeod suffered from traumatic neurosis, brought about by the accident and also by his personality and a personal emotional experience suffered prior to the accident. Dr. Marvin B. Poole of Dunn also testified for McLeod. The defense attorneys, D. K. Stewart of Dunn and Teague, Johnson and Pitterson of Raleigh, contended McLeod's condition is more mental than physical and has been for a long time prior to the wreck. McLeod had sought \$100,000 damages. Jurors deliberated for about two hours.

Legion Exposition Closes Sat. Nite Fair Crowds May Set Record

The American Legion's Four - County Fair drew the largest crowd of the week last night and if good weather holds out attendance for the week is expected to set a record. The good comments heard about this year's fair. "Many people have been surprised not only at the high quality of the agricultural exhibits, but also to find such an outstanding midway," they said. The David Endy Attractions on the midway features more than 25 shows, rides and other attractions. There are more rides this year ever seen at the local fair before. Large crowds are expected again tonight and tomorrow.

Space Officials Are Jubilant Over Success

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI) - The world's mightiest known rocket, the U. S. Saturn - 1, leaped into space today and apparently orbited a 19 ton satellite in a major step toward conquest of the moon. The 190-foot tall Saturn - 1 thundered from its launching pad at 11:23 a.m. EST (12:23 p.m. EDT) and 10 minutes later appeared to have scored its seventh success in as many launchings. A jubilant space agency spokesman said, "With a perfect performance like this, we do have an orbit. But I will confirm it for you shortly."

The Saturn - 1 was inspected personally by President Johnson three days ago. Its fiery departure was witnessed today by nine of the twenty-nine U. S. astronauts who are trained to ride even more powerful models of Saturn on two week voyages in earth orbit, and ultimately, to the moon. Perched on the super rocket's nose 12 stories above its massive cluster of eight engines was a test model of the Apollo space ship that scientists hope to use to launch the first three astronauts to the moon before the end of this decade.

A Route 3, Four Oaks, man was arrested by local ATU agents at his home early last night. James Monroe Lee, 37, was arrested in connection with the seizure of 17 1/2 gallons of non tax paid whiskey found in a woods near his home and a 350 gallons submarine type distillery. Equipment and materials used in the manufacture of the bootleg were found near and at his residence and at the still site. The still had been in operation yesterday. After a night in the local jail, Lee waived preliminary hearing and was released by U. S. Commissioner Abe Elmore under a \$500 bond.

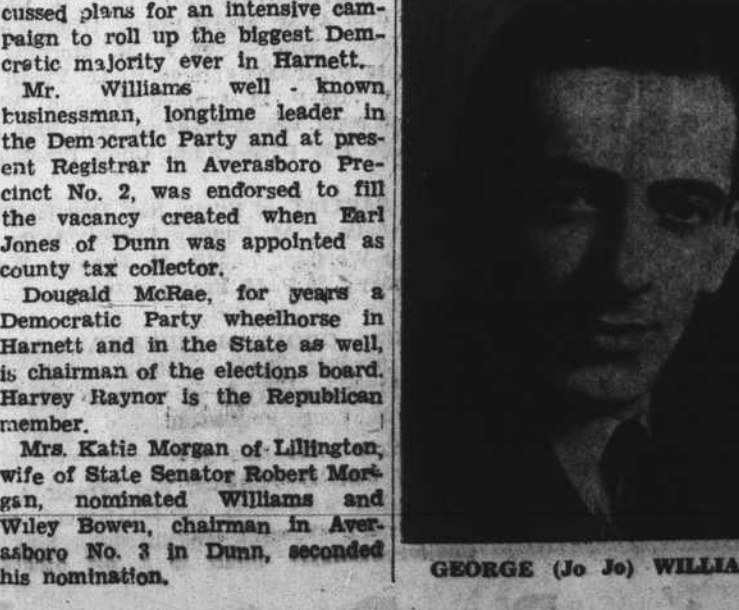
At Dunn High School Council Approves New Traffic Plan

Dunn's city council Thursday night voted to remove the controversial island of sandbags and oil drums used during the past two weeks to channel traffic and avoid congestion in front of Dunn High School. Instead, the council decided, removable barricades will be used in front of the schools each morning prior to the opening of schools and each afternoon at the close of schools. The council also voted to prohibit any parking whatever on the west side of Orange Ave. from the D & S Railroad to Harnett Street between the hours of 7 a.m. and 6 p.m. Parking will still be permitted on the east side of Orange Avenue except on the block beside Betsy Johnson Memorial Hospital. Democratic Leaders Endorse Ticket From Top To Bottom

Williams Endorsed For Vote Board; Demo Ticket Praised

The Harnett County Democratic Executive Committee Thursday night endorsed George W. (Jo Jo) Williams of Dunn to fill a vacancy on the county board of elections, adopted a strong resolution endorsing and praising the Democratic ticket from top to bottom in the Nov. 3 election, and discussed plans for an intensive campaign to roll up the biggest Democratic majority ever in Harnett. Mr. Williams, well-known businessman, longtime leader in the Democratic Party and at present Registrar in Averasboro Precinct No. 2, was endorsed to fill the vacancy created when Earl Jones of Dunn was appointed as county tax collector. Dougald McRae, for years a Democratic Party wheelhorse in Harnett and in the State as well, is chairman of the elections board. Harvey Raynor is the Republican member. Mrs. Katie Morgan of Lillington, wife of State Senator Robert Morgan, nominated Williams and Wiley Bowen, chairman in Averasboro No. 3 in Dunn, seconded his nomination.

The new motel will be located just outside of town in I-95, south, adjoining the Robbie Ann Service Station, owned by R. L. (Bob) Bass. The restaurant will be erected by Mr. Bass' brother-in-law, Hugh Willie Tart, another well-known motel operator here. Cost of the restaurant is not included in the \$150,000 and it will be operated in connection with the motel but as a separate business by Mr. Tart. R. Melvin Turlington of Lillington is the general contractor. Mr. Barefoot said today that Turlington and his associates visited the best motels throughout the country to get ideas and to incorporate them into the All-American. "We would, of course, build a far less expensive motel but we want it to be the best that can be built," added Mr. Barefoot. It is being erected in sections. The first 22-unit section is scheduled for completion between Dec. 1 and Christmas. Winn-Dixie Stores, Inc., operating 631 supermarkets through out the South reported a 4.46 percent sales increase during the eight-week period ended Aug. 22.
