county needs more industry. "We have no great cities but we do have a number of potentially fine business centers that could work together far more effectively rather than compete with each other. We have a superb rural area, but it is being depopulated by migrations to larger industrial centers that afford better opportunities for living."

Pointing out that Harnett has the third largest privately-supported college in the State, Dr. Campbell said, "With the proper help its opportunities are well-nigh unlimited."

He cited better schools and better hospital facilities as the county's two imperative needs at present. Citing the opportunity to vote in favor of schools and progress in the school bond issue next week, Dr. Campbell said, "We must have a better modern public school system if our children are to be given adequate educational opportunity and if as a county, we hope to compete with our neighbors."

Dr. Campbell said that for a long time Harnett "has been far behind our neighbors in adequate hospital facilities, but added that this is no reflection on the two hospitals, Good Hope and Betsy Johnson, "nor does it take away credit from those who have pioneered to make these possible."

Regarding the hospital controversy, he said, "It will be too bad to develop now a split between Harnett County and the Town of Dunn over the location of a new medical center."

"If the Town of Dunn, under its new compromise provision, moves forward to provide such a hospital facing in the direction of the remainder of the county, all of us ought to rally to its support. If this proposed hospital should for any reason fail, then the people of Dunn as one man should support efforts of our county to have in our borders this vitally needed health facility."

"Harnett is my beloved home," reminded Dr. Campbell, "For more than a half century I have labored here in behalf of a finer Christian culture and a more prosperous citizenry. It is a wonderful place to live. Let all Harnett citizens of good will join together for a great forward movement in the interest of every community and of every citizen of our entire section."

got 23 and another 23 are still undecided. What makes it even more surprising is that most voters have never heard tell of Bell.

In each race, the undecided vote could switch the present standing of each candidate.

"I knew Republicans were running strong," said Johnson, "but I had no idea it was anything like that."

He found 33 in favor of the school bond issue, 10 against it and 32 undecided.

In conducting his poll, Johnson assured absolute anonymity, allowed only one vote per family and called at random citizens in the Benson phone area without knowing the political affiliation of any voter in advance. Most of those polled, in fact a great majority of them, said they were Democrats.

Interest in Congress

He said he found interest in the race between Congressman Harold Cooley and James Gardner Holding as much, if not more, interesting than even the races for president and governor.

Johnson's sampling of the voters also turned up interesting - and often confusing - combinations and comments.

Among the undecided, most frequent comment was: "I don't like Johnson or Goldwater, I plan to stay home; I don't like Johnson, but I have not decided; I haven't had time to think about it; I have not studied the candidates enough to know."

And one voter observed: "By the time they finish beating each other's brains out, neither one of them will be fit for President."

A Preyer supporter voted Democratic except for Gavin; others voted straight Republican except for Moore; some voted Democratic except for Gardner; nobody deviated from Republicans to vote for Cooley.

Some of those called emphasized they're staunch Democrats and will vote a straight Democratic ticket, come what may.

But one voter said: "Put me down Republican all the way; I'm a Democrat and always voted straight Democratic before, but it doesn't sound like it now, does it?"

Scott's championship of the Johnson-Humphrey repeal of the Speaker Ban law to allow Communists to speak at State institutions is believed to be the reason for his failure to roll up a better vote in a rural community.

And, as usual, some people wanted to know who was running and for what.

What about pollster Casper Johnson? Which candidate does he support?

"I'm not saying about that," he replied with a smile. "After all, I'm the one taking this poll. My preferences won't enter into it."

Which ought to at least qualify to be almost-professional in his poll-taking.

Mr. Tart also made it clear he would oppose any new taxes of any kind and would see that the taxpayers receive full value for every penny of tax money paid into the county.

"As a property owner, I know the burden on the steadily-rising tax bill and, if elected, I would insist on and demand efficiency and economy in the operation of Harnett's government in every single department at the courthouse," he emphasized today.

Mr. Tart sees the need for many improvements in Aversboro as well as in every other section of the county. He feels that Harnett County will use a greater share of the district's road funds.

In his campaign, Mr. Tart is urging citizens to disregard political party affiliation and to "vote for the man instead of a label."

"After all," he says, "the issues which divide Democrats and Republicans on a national level do not apply to local government units. When it comes to local issues, citizens in both parties are usually pretty much in agreement on principles, if not exact methods."

Mr. Tart married the former Miss Maude Lee, member of another well-known Dunn family.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Tart are active in the civic, social and church life of the community.

Noting that he waited a little late to become a candidate for public office the first time, Mr. Tart observed, "Campaigning is hard work, but I'm enjoying it. I'm having a fine time renewing

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Ford To Enter Rental Field

NEW YORK (UPI) — Ford Motor Co. Thursday announced plans to establish a rent-a-car operation on a country-wide basis under its own name.

The company said the operation will be handled by its dealers, 500 of whom already have agreed to participate. An additional 1,500 or more dealers eventually may take part, the company said.

The new division will offer for rent on a daily basis Falcons, Mustangs, Fairlanes and Thunderbirds in addition to the station wagons, pickup trucks and special vehicles, Ford already has a leasing division.

Airport rental offices now control 60 per cent of the car rental business, and Ford will compete for a share in the remaining 40 per cent, according to the announcement.

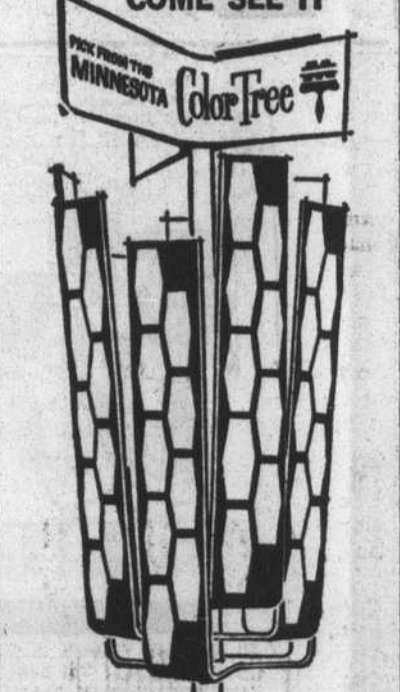
