Appears To Be Suicide, Murder

Ruling Is Awaited In Double Killing

KINSTON UPI — Local police today were investigating what appeared to be a murder-suicide involving a former Kinston theater manager and one of his ticket sellers.

Dead from 38-caliber pistol wounds in the chest were W. T. (Bill) Robertson, 40, and Mrs. Dianne Stroud Provost, 17, of Goldsboro.

Police found the bodies when Mrs. Robertson went to the Robertson home here, found a red car in the carport and the house locked. The Robertsons were separated and had been trying to sell the home.

Police cut a screen door, forced their way in and found the bodies in the den of the fashionable home.

Mrs. Provost was found on a couch and Robertson on the floor. A few feet away lay a 38-caliber Smith and Wesson pistol. A television set in the room was still on.

Coroner Raymond Jarmon estimated that the couple had been dead four or five days. He made no immediate ruling in the case, but Detective Chief Wheeler Kennedy said evidence pointed to a murder-suicide.

Robertson formerly managed the

Paramount and Bright Leaf theaters here, and Mrs. Provost, a striking blonde, was a former employee. Her husband also worked for Robertson as a concession stand operator.

Angier Wreck Damages Heavy

More than \$1200 damage was done to three automobiles and town property in Angier.

On Nov. 4 at 3 p. m., William W. Wiggins, 70, of Raleigh, was charged with disregarding a red light at the corner of Raleigh and Depot streets when his '58 Buick collided with a '58 Volvo driven by Annie C. Griffiths of Rt. 2, Angier. Neither of the drivers was injured.

Investigating officer W. W. Hockaday estimated damage to Wiggins' car at \$150 and to the Griffiths car at \$250.

In an accident at 3 a. m. Nov. 5 Garland Walters 51, of Angier was charged with driving on the wrong side of the road and destroying town property to the sum of \$475.

Walters hit a fire hydrant at the corner of North Broad and Dupree Streets and was taken to Wake Memorial Hospital in Raleigh with head injuries. After receiving 42 stitches, he was released. Officer Jay Cotton estimated damage to Walters' car, a '61 Ford, at \$280.

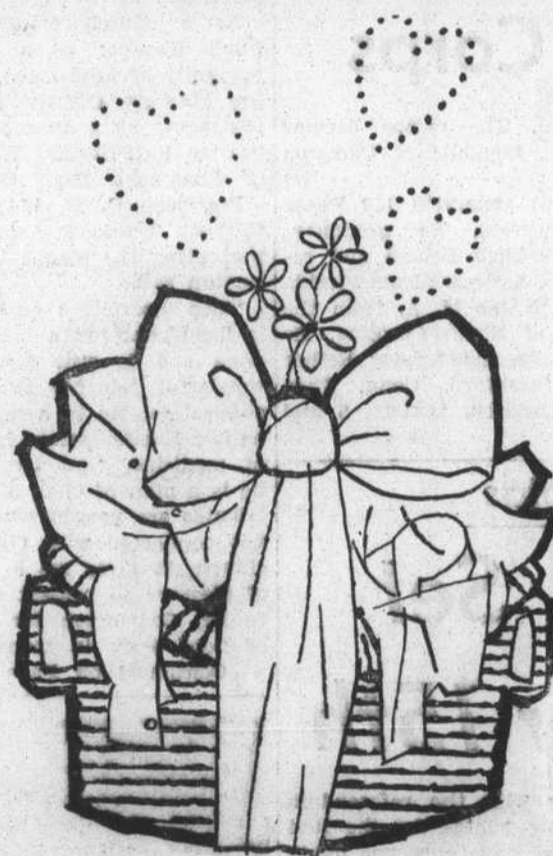
