# Western Harnett Enumerators Named

Enumerators have been named in Harnett county for the 1964 Census of Agriculture, Crew Leader A. J. Stephenson, Jr. said today. Enumerators in Harnett county belong to a force of 23,000 throughout the nation employed temporarily by the U. S. Bureau of the Census for this year's Census of Agriculture.

Enumerators are key workers in an agricultural census. It is the enumerator's responsibility to locate every farm within an enumeration district assigned to him (or her), determine if the operator of the farm has answered all questions on a questionnaire that will be mailed to the farmer by the Census Bureau, help the farmer complete any unanswered questions on the form, check answers for accuracy, and deliver the form to the Census Bureau.

A Census of Agriculture is taken every five years in the years ending in "4" and "9" to gather needed, up-to-date information on the nation's agricultural resources and production. Such information is vital in making decisions affecting many segments of the U. S. economy. Data gathered include the number and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, livestock inventory, information on farm equipment and improvements, farm products sold, and on some production expenditures. Information also will be collected on use of fertilizers, insecticides, and herbicides.

The enumerators will be trained in a special 4-day home study course designed to prepare them for the farm census, their crew leader said.

## Three Teenagers Get Probation

Three teenage boys charged with burning an automobile, stripping it and then burning the remains pleaded guilty to temporary larceny in Dunn court Monday.

The defendants were: Charles Wayne Crane, 17, of Dunn, Route 4; Thurman Edwin Whitman, 17, Box 23, Erwin; and Gerald Walter Gainey, 17, Linden.

They allegedly stole a 1957 Chevrolet from Ralph Roberts on Nov. 10, drove it into Cumberland County, where they completely stripped it and then burned what was left.

Defense attorney D. K. Stewart, in pleading them guilty to temporary larceny, told the court they had good records previously.

The boys said they took the car because Gainey needed its motor.

Judge Woodrow Hill gave them 12 months each, suspended on condition they violate no law; observe terms of probation until they are 21 years old, attend church and Sunday School regularly; attend public school regularly until graduation; and pay \$50 each to Roberts. Their driving license was also revoked for six months.

The defendants still face trial in Cumberland County for stripping and burning the vehicle.
