ful and cooperative. Cost of an entirely new church plant has been put at about \$100,000.

The present sanctuary has just been air-conditioned and redecorated at a cost of about \$7,000 and is one of the prettiest church sanctuaries in the area.

"The big problem," as one member of the committee put it, "is whether the present building can be removed and rebuilt in such a way that members will be satisfied with it."

Members of the committee will report to the congregation on Sunday the various estimates on all plans.
