On 1964 Farm Census

Farm Questionnaires Are Being Mailed

Questionnaires for the 1964 Census of Agriculture are now being mailed out to farmers and ranchers of Harnett county, according to Gladys B. McCaskill crew leader in charge of the census in the county.

The questionnaires are expected to reach the farmers within a few days. This will allow the farmers a period of time in which to consult their 1964 farm business records in order to answer questions on the form accurately before enumerators begin calling on individual farmers to collect the questionnaires. These visits were scheduled to start on November 23 in this county.

An enumerator will call on every farmer in the district under his supervision, the crew leader said. At the time of the call, the en-

umerator will help the farmer complete answers to any questions that prove difficult to understand and check the form for accuracy.

The do-it-yourself aspect of the farm census is aimed at saving time and effort.

The Census of Agriculture is taken every five years in the years ending in "4" and "9" to gather needed, up-to-date information on the nation's agricultural resources and production. Such information is vital in making decisions affecting many segments of the U. S. economy. Data gathered include the number and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, livestock inventory, information on farm equipment and facilities, farm products sold, and use of fertilizers, insecticides, and herbicides.

Homemakers Notes

The cranberry crop is up this year. November is the time of the heaviest marketings. Look for ample supplies of both fresh cranberries and cranberry products.

Use cranberries generously in salad and sauces. Try cranberry juice, it is a refreshing breakfast drink, good, too, as before-dinner appetizer. Cranberries are a good source of vitamin C. Serve a congealed cranberry salad with the turkey.

- 1 package cherry jello
1 cup hot water
1 cup raw cranberries - ground
1 apple - ground
1 orange - ground or 1 small can crushed pineapple
1/4 cup chopped nuts
1/2 cup sugar

Dissolve jello in hot water. Chill until partially set. Mix the cranberries, orange, apple, nuts and sugar. Fold into jello mixture. Refrigerate until firm.

2 cups peanut butter
3 cups dry milk
2 cups confectioner's sugar
3 cups cake crumbs

Combine corn syrup and peanut butter. Stir in gradually dry milk and sugar. Mix until well blended and smooth.

Shape into thin rolls and slice into 1 inch pieces. Roll in cake crumbs. Makes 100 cookies.
