44 Charges Are Thrown Out CHARLOTTE UPI-A Superior

Court judge today dismissed all but two of the 44 indictments drawn up in an investigation of irregularities in the police de-

The state planned to appeal some of the cases, all involving neglect of duty charges against police Chief John S. Hord and six other officers, to the State Supreme Court.

Judge James F. Latham left standing a felony indictment against patrol Sergeant T. W. Wilhams, who was accussed of offering a \$250 bribe in connection with a traffic aaccident, and a manslaughter indictment against Mrs. Helen Virginia House Kuhlman in the death of her infant son in 1953. Williams and Mrs. Kuhlman

have entered pleas of innocent, Latham, in dismissing the indictments, ruled the policemen were employees of the city council and not public officials. He said it was the council's duty to take action in such cases and not the court's responsibility.

The ruling upheld the contention of the 10 defense lawyers although the state attorney general's office, in a brief, contended policemen to be public officials. "I do not think the statute un-
