Nebraska Seeking Third Bowl Win

BROWNSVILLE, Tex. (UPI) — Nebraska's Cornhuskers, sporting back-to-back Big Eight titles for the first time in 30 years, will be gunning for their third consecutive bowl triumph when they meet unbeaten Arkansas in the Cotton Bowl, Jan. 1.

The "Huskers" are continuing their Cotton Bowl preparations here prior to shifting closer to Dallas a few days ahead of the game.

Two years ago, Nebraska edged Miami of Florida, led by quarterback George Mira, 36-24 in the Gotham Bowl. They followed up a year ago by beating Auburn, 13-7, in the Orange Bowl.

The Cornhuskers were selected to meet Arkansas while sporting a 9-0 record which was changed to a 9-1 mark when the Oklahoma Sooners thrashed the Nebraskans in their final game, 17-7. The Sooners notched two touchdowns in the last seven minutes of play.

After he lost 11 players from his 1963 squad who were good enough to be given pro contracts, Coach Bob Devaney didn't have too much trouble convincing people he needed a rebuilding year. Some said Devaney, who owns the best winning record among active major college coaches 62-14-5, would have settled for a 6-4 record this year.

But prior to the opening of the season, a half dozen of the squad's outstanding players told an interviewer from United Press International they felt other teams were taking Nebraska too lightly.

Junior quarterback Fred Duda of Chicago, a slick operator of the pass-run option around whom the offense was built, was sidelined for the year with a severe leg fracture early in the third game.

Set School Record
Into his spot went sophomore Bob Churchich of Omaha, who proceeded to set a school record when he passed for 893 yards. This was also good enough for the Big Eight passing crown. Churchich completed 54 of 102, including seven which went for touchdowns.

Senior halfback Kent McCloughan, a gold medal sprinter in the Big Eight track meet last year, topped Cornhusker and league scoring with 74 points on 12 touch-

downs and a two-point conversion. But the player who most easily captured the imagination of the fans was the fullback 155-pound Frank Solich of Cleveland, Ohio. Undoubtedly the smallest fullback at a major college, Solich led Nebraska runners in yards with 44 and averaged 5.1 per try. His most spectacular moment came when he returned a kickoff 89 yards for a touchdown against Oklahoma State.

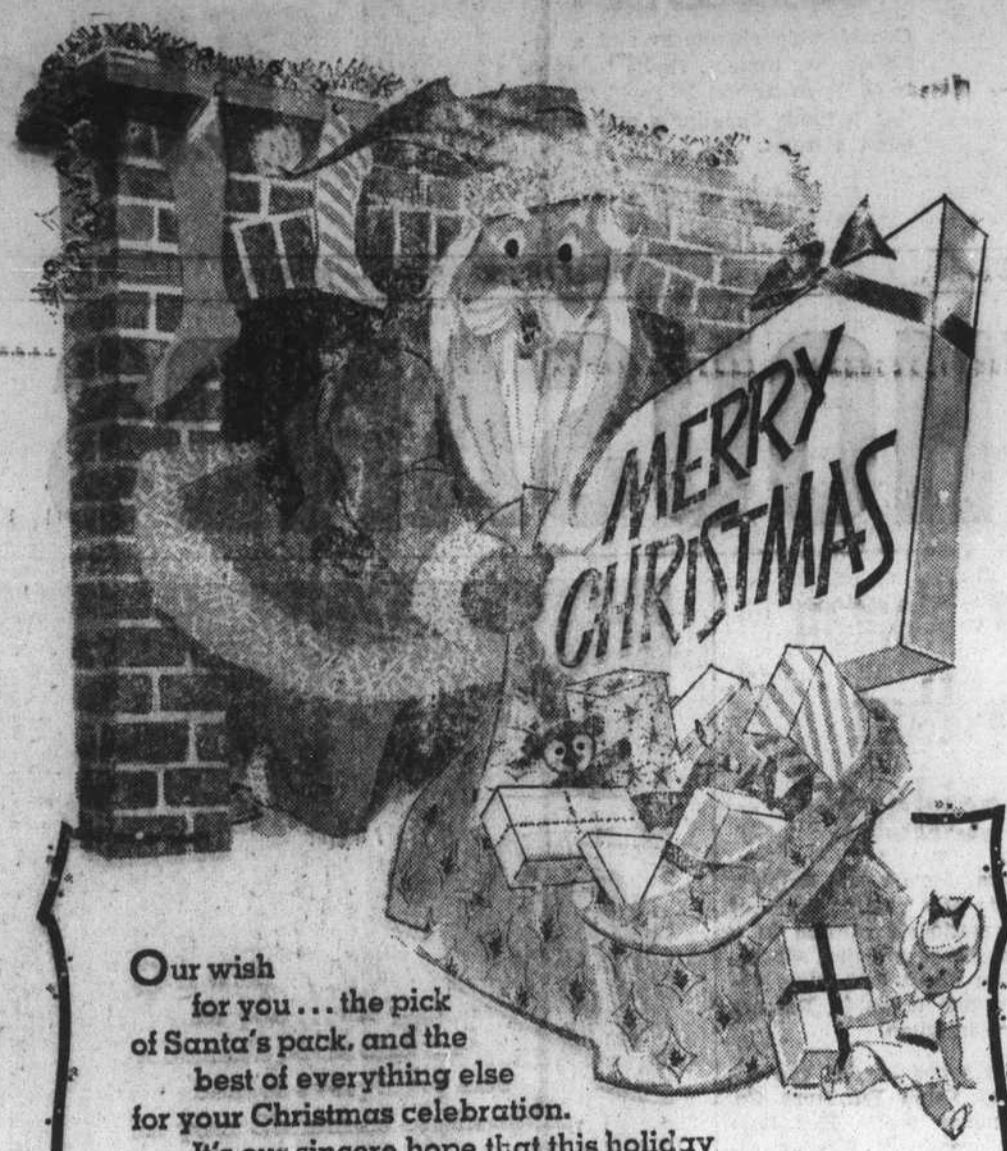
