## Negro Women To Try To Get Congress Seats

Negro women from Mississippi will try to take seats on the floor of the House when Conress convenes next week, it was revealed

James Farmer, national director of the Congress of Racial Equality, and Lawrence Guyot, chairman of the Mississippi Freedom Democratic Party, announced the plan at a news conference.

The women, claiming they were illegally kept off the ballot by Mississippi authorities, are attempting to replace Reps. William Colmer and Jamie Whitten, both Democrats and Republican Rep.-elect Printiss Waker.

Farmer and Guyot said both the Negro women and the three congressmen should be given floor privileges, but no voting rights, until the contests are settled.

They said the women plan to be in the House chamber on opening day, next Monday, to observe an attempt by liberals for barring all five members of the Mississippi delgation from House membership pending settlement of a challenge to election.

Guyot said members of his predominantly Negro group would gather in "silent vigil" near the the Capitol Monday to await the fate of the liberal effort announced last week by Rep. William F.


