Major Battle Is Reported Raging Today

SAIGON (UPI) - U. S. outh Vietnamese fighter-bombers today bombed and strafed Communist Viet Cong positions about 25 miles south of Da Nang where a major battle was reported raging. American planes airlifted troop einforcements to the battle area. Da Nang is the site of a major U. S. air base from which B57 jet

bombers have carried out raids on

Communist North Viet Nam. Eight U. S. Air Force F100 jet fighter_bombers took off from Da Nang to hit at the Communists in a followup to an earlier strike by Bietnamese propeller_driven Sky-

Elements of two government battalions and a ranger battalion were airliftel to the site of the battle in Quang Nam Province, about 325 miles north of Saigon. One U. S. Army officer was wounded slightly Thursday.

In other actions, a U. S. Army soldier was killed and four other Americans wounded in a clash Thursday near the Laotian border, about 50 miles southeast of Da Nang. Another American soldier was wounded by guerrillas 25 miles south of Saigon and a U.S. Army munist boobytrap about 50 miles outhwest of here.

U. S. military headquarters in Saigon reported the end of the biggest helicopter operation of the war with government forces claim. ing only one suspected Communist guerrilla killed.


