**Dunn Hospital Funds Approved** million and \$200,000 in state money was allocated late Friday by the State Medical Care Commission for the construction of 11 new medical facilities in North Carolina.

The total cost of the new prof ects will amount to \$24 million, when local funds are included, said William F. Henderson, executive secretary of the commission.

He said approximately 700 beds will be added to the States hospital system with the approval of

the new projects. With \$63 million worth of medica projects currently in the planning stage or under construction and the \$24 million approved Friday, Hend erson said "there's more money tied up in hospital construction than at any other comparable period in the history of the com

sion's work." Projects approved included: th new 115-bed hospital at Dunn, \$1 million in federal funds, \$100,000 in State money - total cost \$2.5

Also promised from the 1966 federal allotment to N. C. was an additional \$138,500 grant to the new

Dunn hospital. In addition to this federal and state morey, Dunn will also have the following funds for use in erecting the new hospital;

From Town of Dunn bonds, \$550 000; from Betsy Johnson Memoria Hospital funds now on hand, \$2 339.33. The hospital has also been given authority to mortgage the present hospital property, if necessary, for an additional \$200,000 Continued On Page Six)
