Judge Declares **Escape Chamber**

Judge W. H. S. Burgwyn today in Harnett Superior Court sentenced 22-year-old Kenneth Jackson Barefoot to serve 25-30 years in prison for the robbery-slaying of Lynwood Ray Lee, a Dunn restaurant operator, and told him "You're mighty lucky not to be going to the gas chamber."

"North Carolina has a bad crime record and Harnett is one of the most notorious counties in the State, especially for murder, and this is one of the worst cases of all," declared the veteran jurist in passing sentence

"You're guilty of first degree murder; you're guilty of first degree burglary, either of which could have sent you to the gas chamber, you're also guilty of burglary with firearms," Judge Burgwyn told

Judge Burgwyn praised Attorneys Shepard Brvan and Robert C. Bryan for their defense of Bare-foot and told him, "Only by the grace of God, able defense counsel and the mercy of this court are you getting off so easy."

Assistant Solicitor Jake Lamm and private prosecutor D. K. Stewart, representing the Lee family, Judge Burgwyn that Barefood premeditated robbery and murder and strongly recommended that he be given the maximum punishment under the law, which is 30 years The prosecution on Monday accepted a plea of guilty to second degree murder.

Barefoot, who has already spent about half his life in prison, was (Continued on Page 6)
