COLEMAN IS FREED IN SLAYING

Escapes Get Additional Time In County Court

Three inmates of the Harnett prison camp, Elwood Smith, Henry Maze and Edgar B. Cobb, received an additional 90 days in Harnett Recorder's Court for damaging a window they broke out of the camp in escaping.

Judge Robert Morgan ordered the sentence to run concurrently with the additional 90 days each of them received in Harnett Superior Court Monday.

Dr. C. B. Codrington, 76, a practicing physician in Dunn for 49 years and one of the founders of the Dunn public health clinic died Wednesday night about 11:30 o'clock in Betsy Johnson Memorial Hospital here.

School Bus Wreck Kills One, Hurts 40

MARSHALL (UPI) — A teenage girl was killed and 40 other students were injured this morning when a packed school bus went out of control on a winding mountain road and toppled down a 50-foot embankment into a stream.

The 40 were taken to two Asheville hospitals, but none was reported in serious condition. All but one were treated and released.

The victim was identified as Marsha Niline Franklin, 13, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Franklin of the Alexander community in Buncombe County. She was a ninth grade student at North Buncombe High school.

Authorities said her head was crushed by a huge rock as the bus toppled over on its side in the stream. There were 55 students in the bus at the time. Another girl Shirley Fisher, was trapped for about an hour, soaked with gasoline and threatened by rising water.

Morgan Addresses Gastonia Clubs

Reds Spoke At UNC During 63 Legislatures

GASTONIA—State Senator Robert Morgan of Lillington struck back Wednesday at foes of the Communist Speaker Ban Law who have engaged in a massive propaganda attack to assassinate the character of patriotic citizens who support the law.

Pete Ivey, director of the UNC News Bureau, wrote a series of articles in which he put those who favor the law in the same category with the Nazi war criminals. The Charlotte Observer reprinted the article and headlined it "The Big Lie."

Ivey's attack has brought repercussions from across the State from citizens who object to his attack on such prominent and as Sen. Morgan, Ben. Tom White, America, Legion Commander Alvis Carter, Reps. Phil Godwin, Ike O'Hanlon and the majority of legislators who voted for the law.

Jury Returns Verdict Of "Not Guilty"

HAYNEVILLE, Ala. (UPI) — An all-white Lowndes County jury today acquitted Thomas Coleman of the shotgun slaying of white civil-rights worker Jonathan Daniels.

The jurors, most of them friends or neighbors of Coleman, deliberated a total of 1 hour and 43 minutes before returning the verdict.

Coleman, member of a prominent Lowndes County family, had been charged with first degree manslaughter in the slaying of Daniels, a 26-year-old Episcopal seminarian from Keene, N. H., and as—

The State Alcoholic Beverage Control board reported Wednesday that "wet" forces had won 11 victories in 19 whiskey referendums in the state in 1965 with at least five more to go.

Reidsville will hold a referendum Oct. 23, Kennansville, Warsaw and Faison will have elections Nov. 9 and Statesville will set a referendum sometime this year.
