SAIGON (UPI) - Two battalions of hard-core Viet Cong guerrillas killed or wounded scores of Vietnamese government rangers Wednesday night in all-out fighting in the Mekong Delta south of Saigon, a U. S. military spokesman reported

A small team of American advisers accompanying the 500 Vietnamese troops also suffered heavy casualties. A Vietnamese photographer for the Associated Press was killed earlier in the action. The battle took place about 15 miles south of Can Tho and involved 500 government troops and an estimated 1,000 Viet Cong. The number of Americans with the Vietnamese battalion was not dis-
