All Four Shot In The Head By

LAUREL, Md. (UPI) estranged wife of a former Kansas congressman apparently went berserk early today and shot their four children to death as they slept, police said.

Later, Mrs. Denver D. Hargis 37, went into hysterics, when sl was confronted by her 44-year-old husband and another woman.

The couple had been separated for about three months, police sa'd and Mrs. Hargis twice had called her estranged husband's home in Vienna, Va., to threaten the lives of their children.

On her way to an arraignment on the murder charge Mrs. Hargis met the former congressman the unidentified woman. "What you got her here for," she screamed, kicking and wrestling with police.

She was subdued and taken to the nearby Waterloo state police barracks. Police there had been alerted earlier by Hargis who said there might be "serious trouble" at his wife's apartment. Police found the doors and windows of the apartment locked.
