Young People To Help UNICEF

On Saturday night the young people of the churches in Dunn will be among more than 2,500,000 American boys and girls who will devote their Halloween's fun to save the lives of other children in more than 100 countries aided by UNICEF, the United Children's Fund.

Under the sponsorship of Divine Street Methodist Church they will meet at the church at 7:00 where they will receive stickers and tags. "All participants in the program will have proper identification," Rev. C. W. Kirby, the pastor said. "Only children bearing the UNICEF symbol are authorized to collect contributions to the fund."

"For \$1.00, UNICEF can ship enough dried skim milk for 500 glasses to areas where it is most needed. A dollar also represents 500 vitamin capsules for children suffering from malnutrition. Assisted governments match the aid received at least two and a half times.

After the collection the Trick or Treaters and their escorts will meet at Divine St. Methodist Church for a party and to count the money.

"Please give generously when the youth knock on your doors asking for aid," Rev. Kirby concluded. "Remember many go to bed hungry each night and just a few coins can go a long way."
